

# Opening of New School Gym to be Celebrated

Klamath Falls folk will have an opportunity Thursday night to help teachers and patrons of Shasta school, 1951 Madison, in the South suburbs, celebrate completion of one of the finest new elementary school gymnasiums in Southern Oregon.

Every modern feature designed for architectural perfection has been incorporated in this latest addition to a building bulging to the rafters with five grades, first through the fifth of active boys and girls.

The addition, including the 9155 gymnasium, two stage, two lavatories, kitchen, cooler room, storage room, provides for two more classrooms converted from the old basement playroom.

Acoustic properties in the gymnasium are as nearly perfect as it is possible to provide in such a structure. A combination of aluminum foil insulation, acoustic tile in the ceiling and slotted units around the wall are expected to provide excellent sounding boards.

Laminated (glued) wooden trusses from apex of the ceiling to the floor, cross supports that drop into steel saddles and two inch thick planking support the roof.

Children are now using the gym for educational motion pictures, physical ed classes and other recreation activities.

Plywood panels, in natural rubber finish, line the lower portion of the walls and the same construction has been used in the kitchen. Soft pastel green trim contrasts with the redwood trusses.

Provision has been made on the stage for adjustable backdrops and scenery. Floor of the court is maple, the stage is fir.

**GADGETS**  
In the air conditioned kitchen, new gadgets make the cook's life a bit more tenable. Feeding 300 ravenous youngsters in 45 minutes, 5 days a week is quite a stint for Mrs. Merle Brown, head cook, and her assistant, Mrs. Louise Cunningham, who manage with the help of adjustable utilities. Plates pop up on a spring from a cylinder to keep them at a consistent height, table can be adjusted, doors close with magnets, the latest inventions for

air conditioning windows and lots of light make the kitchen a workable area.

Chairs used for programs and other meetings on the gym floor, scout out of sight beneath the stage almost like magic with the help of wheeled carts. A rubber coated ramp from a lower level to the cafeteria prevent spills; the huge cold room holds an appalling amount of food, much of it purchased for the school lunch program by the federal government.

**VARIETY**  
Extensive of the building is brick veneer on two walls, redwood on the other two. A porch roof without visible support, 8 feet wide and 90 feet long is one of the amazing architectural features of this new addition.

Howard Perrin, Klamath Falls drew the plans; Ernest J. Hepp, Medford contractor, did the work, started last September.

The program for open house to be held 7:30 p.m. in the gymnasium will include the invocation by Rev. Keith Fields, pastor of the Bible Baptist church, welcome by Elton Fishbeck, school principal; introduction of the local school board, Dr. Joseph T. Riker, chairman, Stuart Balsiger, Mrs. E. F. Sheridan and the President of Shasta PTA, Mrs. John Insley.

Members of the county school board, LeRoy Gienger, Chiloquin, chairman, Ray Garrison, Dun Colwell, Klamath Falls, Elmer Lemler, Merrill and Cecil Haley, Bonanza; Mr. Hepp, contractor and Howard Perrin will also be introduced.

Carroll Howe, Klamath County school superintendent will speak briefly. There will be music directed by Mrs. Charles A. Henderson, Klamath County Music Supervisor, or the Shasta school rhythm band, the Henley High school band under direction of Richard Hannon and refreshments by the PTA.

Eleven teachers are now employed and two more will be added to the faculty next fall.

# Truce Talks Sink to All-Time Low

MUNSAN, Korea (AP) — Korean truce talks sank to an all-time low Wednesday after the Communists rejected the Allies' "clear, final and irrevocable" package proposal.

The official Allied spokesman said "there is nothing left to discuss." Top negotiators of each side told the other: "The next move is up to you."

Agreement appeared so remote the United Nations Command proposed an indefinite recess of armistice talks.

But the full delegation will meet again Thursday at 11 a.m. at Red Island.

Negotiators abruptly ended the secrecy which had shrouded the talks since the Allied package deal was presented April 28.

In Tokyo Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway promptly announced the virtual Allied ultimatum.

**THREE POINTS**  
It is a three-point package:  
1. The U.N. Command would return 70,000 of 132,000 captured Chi-

nese and North Koreans in exchange for 12,000 Allied troops held by the Reds. This is the crux of the deal.

2. The Communists would be permitted to build and repair North Korean airfields.

3. The Reds would drop their nomination of Russia as a "neutral nation" to help police a truce.

Ridgway said this was a package to be accepted as a whole. He said: "Our position is one from which we cannot and shall not retreat."

The Communists turned down this package and submitted a counter offer Friday. It was disclosed.

Under the Red plan the Communists would get back 132,000 prisoners in exchange for 12,000 U.N. POWs. The other two points would be the same as the Allied hinted repeatedly they wanted to swap Russian supervision for the right to repair airfields.

The big issue is voluntary versus involuntary repatriation of prisoners.

The U.N. Command says only 70,000 prisoners of war and civilians said they would be willing to return to Communist territory. Others threatened suicide rather than return.

**NEUTRAL**  
The Allied package provided for neutral interviews of all unreturned

prisoners after an armistice. Communist observers would be present. Anyone who then said he was willing to be repatriated would be returned promptly to the Communists, Ridgway said.

Removal of secrecy permitted Ridgway to disclose the crucial status of negotiations at the moment of arrival of his successor, Gen. Mark Clark.

Ridgway leaves Monday to succeed Gen. Eisenhower in command of NATO in Europe.

In his statement Ridgway expressed a "sincere desire to obtain a just and honorable cessation of hostilities in order to terminate the terrible toll of suffering, destruction and bloodshed," and to lessen the "risk of spreading the conflagration."

"The responsibility for peace in Korea," he said, "rests on the Communist leaders."

**Value Sets Sale Price Far Off**

PORTLAND (AP) — A value of \$405,000 has been placed on timberlands at Gold Beach, Ore., which two Indians sold for \$135,000, The Oregonian said Wednesday.

The newspaper said it had found the estimate had been made by the U. S. Forest Service.

U. S. District Attorney Henry Hess has filed a suit to nullify the sale. After the timberlands were sold by the Indians they were resold to a white man.

The Portland Trust bank also has a suit pending to nullify the sale. The bank is the conservator of the Indian's property.
