

Cancer Crew to Work Without Knowing Quota

Mrs. M. E. Robinson has taken over as co-chairman of the residential division of the fund drive for the American Cancer Society that is presently underway here.

The cancer fund drive is one of the few that does not announce a quota, and is one of the few local drives held in the past few years which has surpassed the secret goal.

The month of May has been officially proclaimed "Cancer Control Month"—not only for obtain-

ing funds but also for educating the American people to the signs and dangers of cancer.

- There are seven danger signs, according to Mrs. O'Hair:
1. Any lump that does not heal
 2. A lump or thickening in the breast or elsewhere
 3. Unusual bleeding or discharge
 4. Any change in a wart or mole
 5. Persistent indigestion or difficulty in swallowing
 6. Persistent hoarseness or cough
 7. Any change in normal bowel habits.

She points out that the appearance of these symptoms does not necessarily indicate cancer is invariably present. However, a doctor should be consulted immediately since untreated cancer always spreads. Delay is serious.

Cancer strikes one in five persons and education is the only means by which the people can be made to learn the dangers of the disease. Mrs. O'Hair asserted a good portion of the money obtained in the drive goes into the education fund, the remainder to research.

Chief Charges DA Too Easy

PORTLAND - Portland Police Chief Donald I. McNamara has criticized the Multnomah County District Attorney's office in connection with prosecution of drivers responsible for traffic fatalities.

He said the office had refused to issue complaints against drivers in four of the fatal accidents. In four other cases relatives of the victims refused to prosecute, he said. In addition, he added, in two cases where negligent homicide complaints were issued, the grand jury returned not true bills.

McNamara reported there had been 22 fatal accidents in Portland so far this year. That is twice the number of deaths reported for the same period in 1951.

He told patrolmen to crack down on traffic law violators.

SAN FRANCISCO - Full-dress negotiations were scheduled Wednesday in the prolonged seven-day Pacific Greyhound bus strike.

Full Union and Greyhound management committees were to meet with three federal conciliators on the union demand for a five-day week with no loss in pay from the present six-day schedule.

Other bus services shut down by labor troubles include Continental Santa Fe Trailways between San Francisco, Stockton and Southern California and the Southwest.

In the Pacific Northwest, a strike deadline loomed for drivers of Northwest Greyhound buses in Washington, Idaho and Montana. Pacific Greyhound operates in Oregon, California, Nevada, Utah, Texas, New Mexico and Arizona.

WASHINGTON, (AP) - A Defense Department list (AP) Wednesday added 34 names to the roster of Korean War Casualties. Of the total, 10 are dead, 14 wounded.

Acneson Hits Germ Charges

WASHINGTON - Secretary of State Acheson Wednesday denounced a "Russian international crime" - Russia's campaign of charges that the United States is waging germ warfare in Korea.

Acheson spoke out at a news conference. He also said Moscow is insisting it wants peace but month after month is pouring out a campaign of lies against America and Americans.

He said this situation is one of the indications of Russia's intentions in proposing a Big Four peace conference in Germany.

An other indication of Russian intentions, Acheson cited the attack by Soviet fighter planes on a French plane in Germany and Germany to incite western Germany to overthrow the Bonn government.

Acheson's denunciation of Moscow tactics was among the strongest he has made.

He had a detailed statement scolding at the alleged confession of two American fliers, broadcast by the Communists, that Americans actually were waging biological warfare in Korea.
