## Noted Woman Attorney Speaker at BPW Meet Here

Miss Hazel Palmer of Sedalia, Missouri, Chairman of Public Affairs of the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs, Inc., who will speak here during the state BPW convention this week is past president of her local club and the Missouri State Federation of B & P W Clubs. She was born in Missouri, educated in the public schools of Missouri, except for legal education; received her L. B. Degree at the National University School of Law in Washington, D. C. in June 1932; has been in the active practice of law ever since that time, in Sedalia, Missouri, in the firm of Palmer and Palmer, father and daughter combination. Her father, John W. Palmer, is former member of Congress from the old 7th District.

She served as Asst. Prosecuting Attorney of Pettis County; was appointed in December, 1942, by former Governor Donnell (now U.S. Senator Forrest C. Donnell) as the Collector of the Revenue of Pettis County to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the Collector, and has twice been re-elected to that office, and is now serving, and is a candidate for re-election at the November, 1950 election.

She has been active in civic, political and fraternal organizations, active in club work; past president of the Sedalia Bar Assn., and the only woman member; past president of the Women's Bar Assn. of Missouri; past Matron of Sedalia Chapter No. 57, Order of the East-Missouri; past Dean of Omicron Chapter, Kappa Beta Pi International Legal Sorority at Washington, D. C.; past president of the Pettis County Republican Women's Club; former County Chairman of the Pettis County Republican Committee, organizing and conducting the campaign in 1942. She is a member of the National Assn. of Women Lawyers, the Missouri Bar Assn., the League of Women Voters, the National Women's Party, and various other groups and organizations.

Listed in "Who's Who In The Central States"; during all the war (II) served as a member of the Selective Service Advisory Board, and is still so serving; served on the Speakers Bureau of the War Chest Drives in Missouri.
