More Farming Land Needed?

WASHINGTON (AP) — The need for more land in agricultural production was emphasized in plans to the Senate Interior Committee Wednesday for approval of a bill to add irrigation features to Chief Joseph Dam on the Columbia River.

Rep. Horan (D-Wash.) told the committee that surveys indicate the United States will have to increase its farm lands by 115 million acres in the next 23 years if it is to continue to feed citizens of this country and maintain its export program.

Sen. Magnuson (D-Wash.), sponsor of the bill, said "lack of food is one of the real reasons for the spread of communism."

Similar testimony came from Reps. Jackson, Mitchell and Holes of Washington State.

Spokesman for the Columbia River Development League and the Columbia Basin Commission, a state agency, said Washington is far behind other western states in irrigation works.

Residents of the area feel they are entitled to this benefit, he said, inasmuch as they will not benefit from the dam's power output which will be used outside the region.

Hubert H. Walter, an official of the basin commission, offered a statement by Gov. Langille of Washington which he said "unqualifiedly endorses the bill."

Other witnesses included Frank A. Steier, secretary of the Development League, and George D. Zahn, commission member and Methow rancher.

Bureau of Reclamation officials are scheduled to testify Thursday.

Strike Block Bill Opposed

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Labor Department, evidently with President Truman's backing, Wednesday strongly opposed a bill to block strikes in defense-vital plants by providing receivers for industrial firms and unions when they are deadlocked in dispute.

Secretary of Defense Lovett had given some qualified support to the idea of outlawing strikes in essential industries during the emergency when the Labor Department's attitude was made known at hearings by the House Armed Services committee.

Committee aides read a letter from Ralph Wright, acting secretary of labor, saying the measure "violates several important criteria" for labor legislation.

Wright said his letter had been cleared with the Bureau of the Budget, which voiced "no objection." Committee officials said this implied administration support for the port for the views expressed.

Also read to the committee was a letter from Philip B. Perlman, acting attorney general, declining to make any recommendation. Perlman said the issue was outside his department.
