The big stage doubles for a cafeteria and about 300 students get hot noon lunches daily, prepared in a modern kitchen, also new. Classes are served in relays on collapsible tables with wheels that can be folded and stored compactly in a few moments. This group had just consumed well-cooked meat loaf, baby lima beans, bread and butter, jello fruit salad and milk at a cost of 20 cents per pupil.

Frustrations, Hostile Society Bring Nudity?

VANCOUVER, B. C. — Douk hobors disrobe in public because of frustrations and social hostility, a psychiatrist reported Wednesday. That was one conclusion in a 340-page report released by the Consultative Committee on Douk hobors that spent 18 months studying the strange sect that numbers 10,000 members in Southeastern British Columbia. A chapter on psychological problems covered the disturbing practice which has caused several hundred members of the radical sect of Freedom Doukhor branch to be jailed in recent years. HENRIKSEN, Alfred Shulman, psychiatrist at the Seton Institute in Baltimore, Md., said the disturbing is a disguised form of hostility resulting from frustrations imposed on the Doukhobors by their difficulties. Removing one's clothes is a remarkably effective device for making other people uncomfortable and angry. "Shulman's report said 'As a hostile device it is simple and very effective.' The committee recommended that the Sons of Freedom branch, numbering about 2,000, be resettled in another country or in another part of the province. REPEAL. It also urged repeal of the criminal penalty for nude parading, legal recognition of the Doukhor form of marriage under which parents perform the ceremony, and extension of the voting franchise to sect members, who now cannot vote in provincial or federal elections. The Doukhobors, who came to

Canada from Russia in 1899 to escape religious persecution, have defied many Canadian laws. Since 1924 there have been more than 100 cases of arson or dynamiting in British Columbia and authorities have blamed the Sons of Freedom sect.

Credit Bars Removed, Any Terms OK

By CHARLES F. BARRETT WASHINGTON — For the first time in 20 months, the government has given you free rein to buy that television set, or furniture on whatever terms you can get. The Federal Reserve Board Wednesday suspended controls over

down payments and time-to-pay—on grounds that an easing of inflationary pressures made the controls no longer necessary. There was varied reaction as business men and officials tried to size up the case, now that dealers and finance companies may impose their own terms.

Allied Planes Rip Red Rails

SEOUL, Korea — Allied war planes ripped up two Red rail lines in 340 places Tuesday and were back blasting them again Wednesday.

Fifth Air Force fighter-bombers opened 104 more gaps Wednesday morning in the stretch of main line north of Red Korea's capital, Pyongyang, broken in 170 places Tuesday.

Another 170 cuts were reported by pilots from the carriers Valley Forge and Princeton. They worked over an 80 mile segment of the east coast railway centered on Hamhung.

Planes and warships supported front line troops. A raiding Allied patrol fought for two hours early Wednesday with Chinese west of Choron on the Western front.

Other tank-supported raiders destroyed four Red bunkers near Kumbwa on the Central front. Thirteen other bunkers were reported closed by guns of the U. S. cruiser, Manchester, supported by the destroyer Evans in round-the-clock bombardment of the eastern end of the battleline.

The Navy reported the American destroyer D. H. Fox used her motor whaleboat to capture three Red sampans and take 15 prisoners.

Some trade circles, happy over the suspension of controls, predicted a boom in sales, which have been lagging. A few dealers were expected to claim the \$10 down and \$1-a-week type of sale, but in most cases spokesman for business said the changes probably will be moderate.

However, the Bank of America — the world's largest bank — quickly announced much more lenient terms. A few hours after the controls were lifted, the bank announced it will require no down payment for such household appliances as refrigerators, ranges and washers, and allow 24 months to pay.

Its new automobile financing terms are on a sliding scale, depending on the year in which the car was produced. On 1952 and 1951 new models, down payment is 30 per cent, balance in 30 months; on 1950-49-48 used models, 30 per cent down and 24 months for the balance; 1947-46, 30 per cent down, 36 months to pay; and on prewar models, 40 per cent down, balance in 24 months.

On television and radio purchases, the bank will require 10 per cent down and 24 months to pay. Regulation "W" required a one-third down payment on automobiles and 15 per cent down on furniture and appliances, with 18 months to pay.

The government still will regulate terms for real estate purchases — under regulation "X" — and officials said there is little likelihood of a suspension in this field.

An official on the radio and television manufacturers association said down payments probably will be reduced, especially on more expensive sets, but time to pay probably will remain about the same. The National Automobile Deal-

ers Association said finance companies are expected to continue to require about one-third down on most cars, but the payment period may be extended from 18 months to an average of 24 months. Many business men and government officials agreed that the ultimate effects will depend on consumer reaction and business competition. They said dealers are expected to ease up on credit terms as needed to boost sales; but they still will want to keep sound credit accounts.
