

Tribe Snaps Yank Jinx

Cleveland Whips NY 3 in Row

It said here a month ago Cleveland couldn't win the pennant until they learned how to win at Yankee Stadium. Well, they seem to learn fast.

Not since 1947 had the Indians swept a series in the New York Yankees' home park until they humbled the world champions Thursday 12-6, for a third straight.

The Yankee Stadium jinx, the Vic Raschi hex, the Eddie Lopat whammy all went out the window in this first New York-Cleveland series of the season.

Raschi got his jumps Wednesday and Lopat his Thursday when the Tribe's new cleanup man, Ray Boone, went on the warpath. Boone struck the big blow of the game, a three-run homer in the fifth. It hardly mattered that Cleveland poured over six runs in the ninth.

The Chicago White Sox salvaged the finale at Boston, 4-2, on Saul Rogovin's five-hit pitching. Ed Stewart's two-run homer off Red Ray Scarborough in the seventh was the crusher, ending the White Sox's six-game losing streak.

Big Jim Rivera, the St. Louis Browns' slumping rookie first baseman, snapped out of it with a ninth-inning home run that beat Philadelphia.

Don Keaton gets his second shot at Shasta tonight. The big Yreka right-hander shut out the Knights, 11-0, on three hits in a seven-inning stint last Sunday at Recreation Park.

SUNDAY CHOICES — Oretech Coach Art Kirkland will go with Jack Brown and Chuck Tykeson in that order, Sunday against the Lumberjacks.

Rain forced postponement of the Victoria-Vancouver game at Vancouver and the Spokane-Lewiston contest at Lewiston.

Wenatchee outthrew the Braves 14-9 but failed to convert the baseblows into tallies. Four Tri-City runs were unearned, including the winning run in the 11th.

Shortstop Des Charrois scored with the clincher, crossing the plate on a Wenatchee error after a long triple.
