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Mexicans Face Deportation

Seventy-four Mexican Nationals believed in this country illegally, were put aboard a Southern Pacific train this morning for a trip to portland and deportation proceedings.

They were rounded up in this area during the past three days by a group of immigration officers directed by John Wilson, inspector.

The Mexicans, all men and most of them young and unable to speak English, were booked and kept at the County Jail while the roundup was in progress.

U.N. Involved In Oatis Case

WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep Edith Nourse Rogers (R-Mass.) said the United Nations Friday will be given a chance to do something about freeing William V. Oatis from a Czechoslovakian prison and prove it is "more than a debating society."

Mr. Rogers told the House Thursday she was endorsing a legal move proposed by Luis Kutner, a Chicago lawyer specializing in habeas corpus actions, to force the Red Czech regime to release Oatis through World Court action.

Oatis is the Associated Press correspondent jailed over a year ago. He is serving a five to 10 year sentence following conviction on espionage charges which the U. S. government has denounced as unjust and trumped-up.

Kutner said Oatis can be freed by having the International Court of Justice issue a habeas corpus ordering the Czechs to bring the American newsman before a court to determine whether he is lawfully held.

If the court rules Oatis is not lawfully held, Czechoslovakia, as a member of the U. N., would be obliged to observe the ruling. He said the U. N. charter also provides that the U. N. can take action, without fear of veto, against any member refusing to accept the court's verdict.

Kutner said sanctions could include economic reprisals, cutting off diplomatic relations, or even military action.
