Stock Firm Suit Filed

A lawsuit enumerating 15 claims for totaling \$28,345.37 was filed Thursday with the Circuit Court clerk against Lewis H. Ankeny, whose stock brokerage business here failed over five years ago.

The claims are those of various persons who either had given Ankeny money with which to purchase stocks, or had turned over to him stocks to sell.

W. E. Palmer, one of the creditors, is plaintiff in the lawsuit, and the attorney is John B. Ebinger, who also is one of the creditors.

In an earlier court action, a judgment for \$5,000 was obtained against the Hartford Accident and Indemnity Company, which had bonded Ankeny, and that money was paid to the creditors on a pro-rata basis. The judgment is affirmed the pro-rata payment will now being appealed by Ankeny to the Supreme Court and if it is affirmed the pro-rata payment will reduce the individual claims.
