## Poll Shows Eisenhower, Kefauver Favored to Win In Coming State Primary

SALEM, Ore. (AP) — Gen Dwight Eisenhower and Sen Estes Kefauver will win Oregon's May 16 presidential primary by clear majorities, in the collective opinion of Oregon newsmen.

An Associated Press survey indicated that if the election were held this week, Gen Eisenhower would win the preference of Oregon voters as the Republican candidate for President.

But whether he wins all of the state's 18 convention delegates depends on how many of the eight supporters of Sen Robert A. Taft of Ohio who aren't bound by the presidential preference vote — are elected as delegates.

**FAVORITE**

Sen Kefauver is an odds-on choice to win the Democratic primary. His two opponents — Gov Adlai E. Stevenson of Illinois and Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas — are unwilling candidates. This apparently assures Kefauver of 12 convention votes, because all Democratic candidates for convention delegates are pledged to support the winner of the presidential primary.

The AP survey, which covered all of the state's 36 counties, added up to an indicated vote of 61 per cent for Eisenhower, Gov Earl Warren of California, who is on the ballot and Sen Taft, who is not, are expected to battle it out for second place in the Republican primary.

The survey gave Warren just over 16 per cent, and Sen Taft just under 16 per cent. But the estimates were made just as the California governor was opening his Oregon campaign. And the Taft picture could be changed by a last-minute drive for write-in votes by Taft supporters. Many newsmen said they expect Warren — always a popular figure in Oregon — to increase his strength.

**WRITE-IN**

Sen Taft did not enter the Oregon primary personally but his state organization has asked that his name be written in.

Eight Taft adherents filed for delegate to the Republican national convention by petitions, and so did not have to sign a pledge to support the primary winner.

Taft supporters are concentrating upon electing these eight candidates. Several of them might be successful. Gov Douglas McKay Douglas — an unwilling candidate, whose administration is solidly behind Eisenhower, charges these eight candidates with scuttling the purpose of the primary.

The remaining votes — adding up to 2 per cent — are expected to be divided up among the following: (1) Gen Douglas MacArthur, who has asked Oregon Republicans not to vote for him; (2) Harold E. Stassen, who is actively campaigning; (3) Oregon's Sen Wayne L. Morse, whose name was entered against his wishes and who is campaigning through the state for Eisenhower; (4) William R. Schneider, St. Louis lawyer.

**DEMO SHARES**

On the Democratic side, the estimates give Kefauver 71.6 per cent compared with 18.4 for Stevenson and 10 for Douglas.

Gov Stevenson has said repeatedly he is not a candidate, but when he came to Oregon recently, he left many political writers believing that he would accept a draft nomination. Justice Douglas went as far as to buy space in the state's official voters' pamphlet to ask people not to vote for him.

The estimates used in the survey were made by newsmen on daily and weekly newspapers and radio stations; also by regular correspondents of the Associated Press in counties where no newspaper or radio station estimate was available. Many of them were based on local polls. To arrive at an estimate for the state, the figures for each county were weighed in accordance with primary registration figures.

## U.S. Farm Outlook On Bright Side

WASHINGTON (AP) — Crop production prospects have brightened during the past three weeks to raise government hopes that this year's harvest of food and fiber crops may set a record after all.

A month ago prospects were not good because unfavorable weather had retarded spring planting.

But a new crop survey made by the Agriculture Department Friday said conditions have improved greatly and crops are now normal or advanced in most areas of the country.

A wheat crop which may be the second or third largest of record was said to be indicated. The winter wheat portion of the crop was forecast at 986 million bushels. An average spring wheat crop would give a total combined crop of about 1,293,000,000 bushels. Only in 1947 and 1948 were larger wheat crops harvested.

But there is a possibility the spring wheat crop may be considerably larger than normal. In that event, it would be possible for total wheat production to exceed the second largest, 1,313,000,000 produced in 1948.

By comparison, total wheat production last year was only 987 million bushels. The government had set a 1952 goal of 1,165,000,000.

Officials said the big wheat harvest would in all likelihood be accompanied by a sharp reduction in grower prices at harvest time. The decline would be limited by the government's price support program.

## Convict Wounded In Prison Brawl

SALEM (AP) — One convict was stabbed in the back and slightly wounded in a brawl that developed at the Oregon State Penitentiary Thursday when some 20 inmates got drunk on laquer thinner.

Prison Warden Virgil O'Malley said no guards saw the brawl and the convict who wielded the knife was not known. He did not identify the victim but said he was not hurt seriously.

The thinner was stolen from a machine shop and commissary. The convicts drank it and soon started fighting, O'Malley said. Several gallons of thinner were recovered.

## DIES

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Little Bozo, the clown, is dead.

The four-foot circus midget, whose real name was John F. Puzo, succumbed to a heart ailment Friday. He was 45.

Bozo had appeared with many circuses and played to audiences all over the world. He also had been in several movies, among them "Sign of the Cross" and "The Freak."

## Politicos Talk Issues

Four states name presidential nominating delegates Saturday amid fresh talk about hot topics like foreign aid spending and civil rights.

A total of 62 Democratic and 16 Republican delegates to national conventions at Chicago in July will be chosen at conventions in Nevada, Michigan, Utah and Virginia.

In Nevada state conventions, Republicans at Tonopah pick 12 delegates and Democrats at Wells select a 10-vote delegation. A Democratic convention at Grand Rapids puts together Michigan's 40-vote delegation. Two Virginia district meetings make four more of the state's 23 GOP delegates, six of whom already are chosen. Utah Democrats convening at Salt Lake City name 12.

Two southern Democrats in Washington voiced their views on foreign aid spending — an issue which drew clashing opinions from the top contenders for Republican nomination as President.

Sena Ellender of Louisiana and George of Georgia sides with Sen. Taft of Ohio and against Gen. Eisenhower.

Eisenhower, allied defense chief in Europe until June 1, had said any cut deeper than one billion dollars in the proposed seven billion nine hundred million dollar foreign aid fund would imperil the nation's security. Taft flatly disagreed saying a reduction twice that much would not hurt.

Commenting Saturday, the southern Democrats said:

Ellender — "I think most people will like Taft's position better than Eisenhower's."

George, who expects to stick with the proposed one-billion cut — "I don't think, however, that a two billion-dollar reduction would do any damage at all."

## Woodworkers Win Demands

PORTLAND (AP) — Some 1200 CIO Woodworkers early Saturday were granted an employer-financed health and welfare program by the Simpson Logging Co., of Shelton, Wash.

The company's agreement to pay the cost of the program — 71 cents for each straight time hour — covers a two year period, a union spokesman said. The remainder of the contract, in which some local issues are still to be settled, would be for one year only.

The agreement is subject to approval by union members of the company's operations in Washington State.

Some 40,000 woodworkers have been on strike for 13 days to back up demands for an improved contract. Center of the dispute has been the welfare program, which major employers had refused to finance directly. They wanted to continue to deduct the cost of the program from the workers' paychecks.

Simpson is the biggest company to settle with the union since the strike began. A number of smaller operations have settled, but the union was not granted an employer-financed health and welfare program. St. Paul and Tacoma Lumber Co., settled earlier, too, but the health and welfare program was not at issue.

Simpson also granted a 7 1/2 cent hourly wage increase, three additional paid holidays, a 2 cent increase in night differentials and an improved vacation program.

The settlement was announced by Federal Mediator Bob McClelland.
