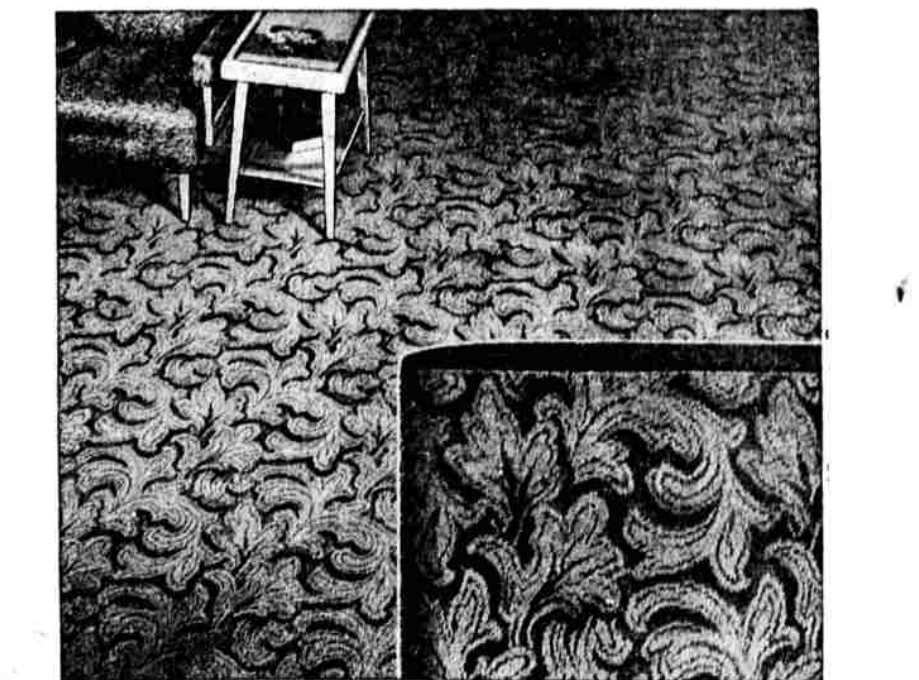
23 Years Ago
