But students at this famous "J" school, as they call it now, do not agree with the housewife of their survey.

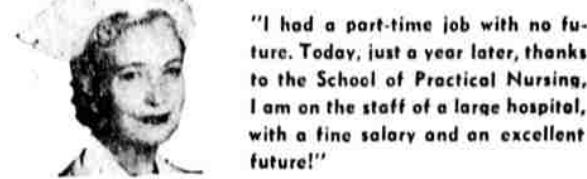
Being young and eager journalists about to set out on their mission to save the world with their doughty typewriters, they are seeking bigger and better international dragons to slay.
