Marciano Draws Suspension

Rocky Stops Reynolds

PROVIDENCE, R. I., May 12.—Heavyweight contender Rocky Marciano begins a 30-day suspension Tuesday after rousing his undefeated string to 40 bouts with a third-round knockout of Bernie Reynolds of Fairfield, Conn. Marciano blasted out the former New England heavyweight titlist in 2:11 of the third of their scheduled 10-round Monday night bout to end a crowd pleasing slugfest match. Marciano's suspension by the Maine Boxing Commission was imposed because he boxed his 19-year-old brother instead of advertised opponents during a recent exhibition tour of Maine.

Jackie, Phil Top Batters

NEW YORK (AP)—Two veteran "money players," shortstop Phil Rizzuto of the New York Yankees and Second Baseman Jackie Robinson of the Brooklyn Dodgers, took the American and National League batting honors Tuesday. Rizzuto, last of the Yankee "old guard," and Robinson each enjoys a seven-point lead. Rizzuto is hitting .351 and Robinson .303. The top 10 in each league underwent a shakeup with exactly half of last week's leaders dropping from the list. Roy Nienman, the lone looking outfielder of the St. Louis Browns, tumbled off from a pace-setting .424 to .295.

Rickey Draws Bucs' Wrath

PITTSBURGH, Pa.—Branch Rickey, the guy with the plucky eyebrows and the cellar-dwelling baseball club, thinks unrest is good for a team. "In fact," comments the 69-year-old general manager of the Pittsburgh Pirates, "We should have more of it." That doesn't exactly mean there's dissent among the Pirates. But Rickey's remark seems to indicate something is wrong. "What's wrong?" Well—the Pirates have won just five games in 25 attempts. "You don't think players are satisfied under those conditions, do you?" asked Rickey. "I doubt it." But whatever troubles the Bucs Rickey gets the blame. He drew the ire of some of the players recently by calling the team "the worst in 30 years." One player, who asked his name not be used, said afterwards "the worst club in 30 years? Well, he put most of the players on the field and in their position himself." Answered Rickey, "I'm not worried about any remarks. What I'm worried about is winning games, and a better team. If there is dissent, I'm sorry. If there is no dissent, I'm sorry. There's no harm in it."
