

Commies Will Demand Daily Truce Sessions

MUNSAN, Korea (AP)—Communist negotiators announced Wednesday they will insist on daily truce talks meeting the Allied command says the Reds have turned into "propaganda attacks which contribute nothing" toward peace in Korea.

The Red announcement came from North Korea Gen. Nam Il. He made it clear the Reds have no intention of breaking off negotiations. He has been doing almost all of the talking at recent meetings.

Wednesday he injected the Korean island prison camp kidnapping of Brig. Gen. Francis T. Dodd into the negotiations.

Parley Seeks Timber Peace

PORTLAND (AP)—Another attempt was under way here Wednesday to settle a strike that has idled some 40,000 CIO Woodworkers in the mills and woods of five Pacific Northwest states.

The negotiation session arranged by the Federal Mediation Service, is the largest held since the strike began more than two weeks ago.

The Long Bell Lumber Company and the County Operators Association of Washington, the Willamette Valley Operators of Oregon and the Lumbermen's Industrial Relations Committee will represent management. Mediator Bob McClelland said.

Each of the employer groups has met separately with union negotiators during the past week.

McClelland said that in all the earlier sessions two issues appeared to be major stumbling blocks in the way of settlement. The union's demands for an employer-financed health and welfare program, and for a more lenient holiday qualification clause.

The text of the issues are not raising much concern, McClelland said. They are a 7 percent hourly pay advance, a 2-cent increase in night differential, three additional paid holidays and an improved vacation program.

A number of small mills have settled with the union. In most of these settlements the union has not demanded that employers finance the welfare program.

Latest to settle on this formula are the Pioneer Lumber Company of Beaverton, Ore., and the Tite Knot Pine Mill at Sisters, Ore.

He said this was proved by concessions which Brig. Gen. Chances P. Colson granted Red prisoners last week to effect Dodd's release.

The very wording which Nam Il quoted was previously labeled by the U. S. military command in Washington as misleading.

Colson was replaced Tuesday as Koje Commandant.

Vice Adm. C. Turner Joy said Nam Il brought up the newest incident on turbulent Koje solely "to propagandize from this text rather than act seriously in interest of an armistice."

"It is equally apparent," Joy told Nam, "that the major reason for such obstruction tactics is your fear of open joint screening of prisoners of war, conducted under fair and equitable circumstances."

Screening of prisoners, and what they said during the process, is the basis of the Allied armistice package, the issue over which talks are deadlocked, and a motivating factor of Red POWs in kidnapping Dodd, then Koje prison commander, last Wednesday.

The U. S. command said only 70,000 of 120,000 POWs and civilian internees want to go to Red China or North Korea after an armistice. It won't turn anyone over to the Communists against his wishes, it added. The Reds insist they should get at least 132,000 back.

Nam Il charged the Allies were trying to delay truce talks by their "outrageous attitude."

He said unless the U. S. command "explicitly declares" it wants to break off the conference the Communists will insist on daily meetings and continue to refuse to accept the final allied package offer.

He said Colson, while Koje commander, "openly admitted treatment of war prisoners inconsistent with international law and in violation of the Geneva convention," admitted forcible screening, and conclusively testified before the whole world to the iron-clad pact that your so-called voluntary repatriation is solely the result of violence and forcible screening."

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Another meeting of top truce delegations was scheduled, at Communist insistence, for 11 A. M. Thursday.

70 Americans Made Knights

LONDON (AP)—Some 70 Americans made the grade Wednesday as knights—on paper at least—in Debrett's Peerage. That is Britain's blue-blood handbook which up to now has screened out honorary "knights."

In the past Debrett's has not listed honorary knights. But Editor C. F. Hankinson thawed out this year at the suggestion of Douglas Fairbanks Jr., a film star knighted for wartime service with British forces.

Among the Americans listed in the 1952 edition of the famed reference work are Generals Dwight D. Eisenhower, Douglas MacArthur and George C. Marshall.

However, they won't be Sir Dwight or Sir Douglas. The knight doesn't use the title unless he's dubbed—tapped on the shoulder as he kneels—by the king, and that is not done for the honorary knight-hoods.

"The bestowment of their honors is a pleasing sign of the ever increasing bond between our two great countries," said Hankinson.

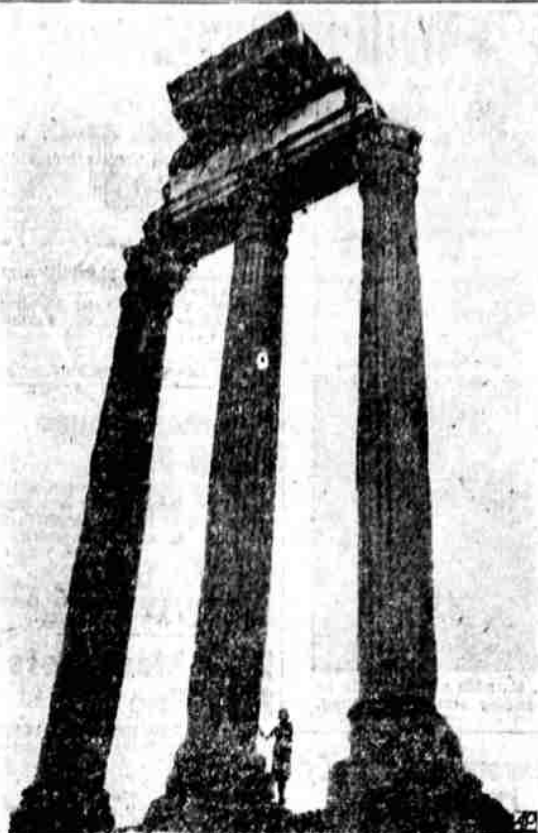
The chronicle began in 1781, the year of Lord Cornwallis' surrender at Yorktown. It now contains about 50,000 names.

Abortion Guilt Gets 6 Months Steel Crisis Avoidable?

PORTLAND (AP)—Ruth Barnett, convicted of operating a nuptial clinic where an abortion was performed, Tuesday was sentenced to six months in jail.

A chiropractor who worked for her, H. G. Weigart, also received a six-month sentence. Two other employees, Weigart's wife, Edith, and Blaise Hillman were sentenced to two months in jail. The cases were brought under a charge of maintaining a nuisance.

Charges against a fifth defendant, Mary Kuever, were dropped after Judge Martin Hawkins said he would entertain a motion for dismissal.

Those sentenced also are under grand jury indictment on charges of manslaughter by abortion. Those cases have not yet come to trial.

Honor Redeemed By Two Deaths

MANILA (AP)—Mook Kim regained his honor Wednesday. He did it by slaying the threat of Chang Chit and then leaping to a burning death in a barbecue pit.

In suicide notes Mook said Chang persecuted him and death for both was the only way Mook could redeem his honor.

AUSSIES DIE

CANBERRA, Australia (AP)—One hundred and sixty-nine Australians died in Korean fighting up to April 30, Army Minister Josiah Francis told the House of Representatives Wednesday. The war cost Australia \$30,000,000 up to Feb. 29, he said.
