Nomellini Compares Football, Wrestling

MODESTO, Calif. (NEA)—Large Leo Nomellini has returned to the wrestling scene after a sensational sophomore year in professional football.

The former Minnesota All-American star was a stickout in the San Francisco 49ers' powerful line, was one of the National Football League's finest tacklers.

Following a 20-yard touchdown run after recovering a Sammy Baugh fumble in the Pro Bowl game in Los Angeles, Nomellini immediately started his second year on California's grunt-and-growl circuit.

The huge 260-pound Italian Man Mountain credits football with helping to develop him into a top-flight grappler, says the latter is tougher than pro ball.

"I feel more lunker in the ring," relates Leo the Lion. "Maybe it's because wrestlers are more my size. I'm a big guy in football. Men of my size are much more common in wrestling."

Nomellini has reference to Mike and Ben Sharpe, the Pacific Coast tag champs, Tarzan Kowalski, Hard Boiled Hagererty and Hens Hermann. These are men he has met in the ring.

"Once I weighed 270 for football," he continued. "But now I'm down to 258. Wrestling two or three nights a week sweat it off. I don't know how little guys like Sander Szabo and Gino Garibaldi can stand it five nights a week, and they're older. I suppose they know how to rate themselves."

According to the clinical tests made by the University of Minnesota physiological department, Leo says pure minutes of wrestling is equal to 60 minutes of football in energy expended.

Nomellini points out this is in amateur grappling when you're on the canvas most of the time and there's no letup. With time outs, starts and stops there only about 11 minutes of actual playing time in football.

"Wrestling and football require different sets of muscles," the bull-necked Nomellini explains. "In the ring, you're practically naked while on the gridiron, you're heavily padded. This means you don't get bruised all over."

Leo plans to make a career of wrestling after his football days are over. Most coast observers feel that he will go far.

The fans go for his clean style and lack of phoney glamour. Leo has no use for fancy robes and theatrics. He enters the ring simply attired in a white All-American sweater.

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Washington Raps Ducks

SEATTLE, 5-5 — Washington handed Oregon an 11-3 trouncing in a wild Northern Division baseball game Tuesday and retained an outside chance of copping the league title.

The win gave Washington a sweep of the two-game series and dropped Oregon into second place, half a game behind Oregon State.

To take the pennant, Washington must win its four remaining games: two against Washington State and two with Idaho — and hope for a split in the final two Oregon-OSC home — and — home series.

Tuesday's game was played on a field made slippery by occasional showers, accounting for some of the 12 errors — seven for Oregon and five for Washington — recorded in the nine innings.

Pitchers for both teams had trouble finding the plate. There were 23 bases on balls, nine wild pitches and two hit batsmen.

Washington scored four runs in the second inning, three in the third, one in the fourth and three in the fifth. Oregon tallied four in the seventh without a base hit, and four Washington errors let in four more Ducks in the eighth.

attle in the Pacific Coast League last year.

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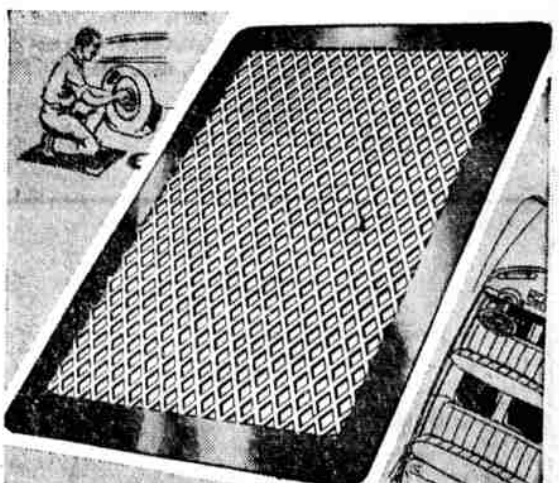
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
