**Youth Said Innocent In Girl Murder**

**EUGENE** — Mary Ellen Campbell was shot by 15-year-old Elmer Harlan Belcher's gun, but the shot was not fired by the boy, a defense attorney said in circuit court here Tuesday.

The boy is on trial for first degree murder in the fatal shooting of Mary Campbell, 18-year-old deaf mute who was killed near her farm home in the Cottage Grove area April 4.

The boy's attorney, Herbert Lombard, told the court he would present testimony to show that a man told young Belcher to bring the gun into the woods.

Lombard said the boy would testify that Mary Ellen's grandfather, who Lombard did not identify by name, took the gun and motioned Mary Ellen to follow him into the woods.

Elmer will testify that he heard two shots and then saw the man run out of the woods, Lombard said. The man gave the boy the gun and told him to say he (Elmer) had shot her, Lombard said. His client would testify.

District Attorney C. E. Luckey said in his opening statement that he would present a wire recording made at the time the boy was questioned about the shooting. Earlier Luckey said Belcher shot the girl because his friends had teased him about her pregnancy.

First witness Tuesday was the slain girl's father, Dana Campbell. He told of hearing two shots in the woods and testified that Belcher had been working near the Campbell farm.

**Power Project Permit Sought**

**WASHINGTON** — Pacific Gas and Electric Co., San Francisco, Tuesday asked the Power Commission for a three-year preliminary permit for a hydroelectric development on the McCloud River and its tributaries in Siskiyou and Siskiyou Counties in California.

The company power from the project would be distributed and sold to the public in Central and Northern California.

A preliminary permit is for the sole purpose of giving the holder priority while conducting surveys and investigations necessary to prepare an application for a commission license.

The commission said another application for a preliminary permit for power development on the McCloud River filed by the California Oregon Power Co., Medford, Ore., is pending.

**Jeanette MacDonald Scans Movie Comeback Offerings**

**HOLLYWOOD** (NEA) — There's a movie comeback gleam in Jeanette MacDonald's eyes and the one-time queen of MGM's super-duper musicals is admitting she's had all kinds of offers during her year's absence from Hollywood.

"But I didn't like the scripts," she said between rehearsals for the first filmed TV version of Duffy's Tavern. "I read scripts all the time," she said, "but I still haven't found one I really like. I'd rather leave a pleasant memory than come back and do a little old stinker."

Jeanette is clowning with Ed Gardner and singing Victor Herbert's "Sweetheart" on the Tavern show and then she hops back to her New York apartment to prepare for a summer concert tour.

Her opinion of current Hollywood musicals: "They don't seem to have much plot. That's what I always fought for."

A regular TV show for Jeanette and hubby Gene Raymond? "Maybe," she said.
