**PORTLAND**—Larry B. Mills, Seattle, was dead and his wife seriously injured after a North Portland traffic mishap Tuesday. Their car, traveling at about 60 miles an hour, crashed into a parked car. Witnesses said that just before the crash Mills fell back in the seat and his wife, sitting beside him, struggled to gain control of the car. Police were investigating the possibility that Mills died just before the mishap.

Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas and Gov. Adlai Stevenson of Illinois share the Democratic ballot with Kefauver, but both have urged the people not to vote for them.

"I agree with Sen. Morse," said Sweetland, "that for outsiders to come into Oregon and tell us who to elect a delegate is properly resented."

The Eisenhower slate of 16 delegates was recommended by Sen. Henry Cabot Lodge (R-Mass.), national Eisenhower chairman.

## WSB Shapes Wage Pact For Oilmen

**WASHINGTON**—The Wage Stabilization Board (WSB) was primed Wednesday to clamp a general but flexible ceiling on the amount of wage increases 90,000 striking oil workers might get under anti-inflation rules.

The strike entered its third week, with no signs of early settlement.

The WSB, in studying six scattered wage pacts of already reached in the industry, obviously hoped that the amount it allows will act as a guideline to more than 26 unions engaged in the strike against the nation's major oil companies. And company and union officials said they hoped the same thing.

The Petroleum Administration for Defense (PAD) prepared to name petroleum supply directors in 15 states most seriously affected.

Secretary of the Interior Chapman set up the framework of the organization, designed to "direct petroleum to essential uses in the interest of national defense and maintenance of a sound civilian economy."

Chapman's order said there is a

major dislocation in many areas. He asked all government agencies outside the military to put their purchases of aviation gasoline on the same restricted basis ordered for commercial, private and foreign aircraft.

That would be approximately 6 per cent of the quantities used during March. His request applied to the 26 days beginning May 12.

**OIL LOSS**  
The strike has cut off slightly more than one-third of the country's oil production. It has brought a work-halt in oil

fields, pipe lines and refineries. O. A. Knight, head of the CIO Oilworkers union and major spokesman for the 22 unions involved, told reporters he questioned whether the strike has resulted in a national emergency.

He said supplies to Korea and the military are being maintained.

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
