Keep Young Save Self Lighten Jobs

WASHINGTON — Housewives, chanting the spring cleaning blues, could lighten the back-breaking bugaboo by taking some tips from industry and large institutions.

"By watching the way the cleaning is done in hotels, office buildings and hospitals, housewives can learn to make their own tasks easier," a home management specialist, U. S. Department of Agriculture, explains. "The clean women assembled all their cleaning utensils and supplies and carry

them with them from pot to pot. This saves running back to the storage closet for individual items. Furthermore, they try to put them all in something easy to carry or something to pull along on wheels. It is easier to reach upper walls and ceiling, or the floor, by having long handles on brushes, mops, vacuum cleaners, dust pans and other gadgets. Experts at the department suggest that housewives can rig up a small board platform on casters with a handle or strong rope so that heavy things can be pulled around from room to room. Some women use tea - carts or Junior's wagon.

When washing woodwork or other surfaces use both hands, putting dusting mitts on each. Using one hand to put the cleaning solution on the surface and the other to rinse it off or dry it. "Two-handed team work makes

things go faster," one housecleaning expert said. Here's a tip about curtain-washing. Don't over-stretch when drying. Cotton, rayon or other machine-washable curtains can be dried on frames, but you shouldn't try to get them back to their original size. Experts suggest that when you buy curtains of these fabrics you allow for considerable shrinkage. Nylon, rayon and spun glass curtains need not be put on frames. They do not shrink. When washing very sheer type curtains, put them in mesh bags if you're using a washing machine and use plenty of lukewarm water and a good detergent, running the machine only a few minutes. "The old household theory that the hard way is the good way is out," one home management specialist concluded.

West Germany To Seek Funds

BONN, Germany (U. P.) — West Germany is expected to ask the United States for at least a billion dollars aid to start arming German soldiers for western defense after the Allied-German "peace contract" and the European Army treaty are Germany for the next year.

Authoritative sources said Wednesday that the Germans probably will need this amount of foreign aid during the first year alone of their rearmament.

The European Army treaty envisions the raising of 400,000 German troops for the six nation force. Britain may contribute some equipment to the German units but the main burden will fall on the German taxpayer and the United States, these sources said.

They estimate the first year of German rearmament will cost between 3 1/2 billion and 4 1/4 billion dollars.

The new German defense budget for the year beginning July 1 totals almost 2 1/2 billion dollars.

Part of this must help pay the costs of quartering Allied forces in Germany for the next year.

Recruiting of the first German troops since World War II is expected to start early in 1953.

Then the big gap between rearmament costs and available funds will show up. The Germans are expected to ask the United States to supply most of the difference.
