Canadian Stock Trading Attracts Public Interest

TORONTO (AP) — The trading floors of Canadian stock exchanges send out a noisy accompaniment to Canada's post-war industrial, mining and oil development.

The traditional traders are there: the investors; and the men who watch the market day-to-day and year-to-year, hoping to win a dollar or a fortune out of its rise and fall.

But also, heading back in numbers, not seen since 1929, is the general public, and stock quotations have again become favored reading or lunch-time conversation for office-worker, mechanic and housewife.

Swelling the tide is a flow of money from the United States, and a considerable flow of European money seeking a safe place.

There is, it is true, heavy buying of speculative issues which may or may not turn out right, but, overall, Canadian observers believe the market activity is no more than a mirror of real Canadian expansion.

Here are some statistics which may give some backing to this view: Canada's gross national product has about quadrupled in dollar value since 1929, from \$5,707,000,000 to \$21,241,000,000 in 1951.

Simultaneously, the value of shares traded on the Toronto Stock Exchange rose in about the same proportion, from \$293,293,960 in 1929 to \$1,174,246,840 in 1951; or, to choose a war-free year, in lesser proportions from \$444,406,372 in 1930.

Canada's two big exchanges are

Toronto, in the province of Ontario, and Montreal in the province of Quebec, with Toronto the more spectacular because of its heavy trade in mines and oils.

"Moose-pasture" salesmen are sharp characters attracted, chiefly to Toronto, by Canadian mining and oil development, who use the long-distance telephone and mails to sell worthless stocks to the gullible.

Some United States estimates say they take as much as \$50,000,000 a year from Americans, though Ontario securities officials think the correct figure is below \$10,000,000.

Canadian authorities find them difficult to eradicate, partly because of the problem of checking an over-the-border telephone call and mail misrepresentation; partly because they move from address to address; but mostly because some people will buy anything.
