Senator Raps Steel Industry

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Sen. Humphrey (D-Minn.) said Thursday the steel industry has done greater disservice to the country by undermining the defense stabilization program "than any foreign iron could ever do."

The 2,500 CIO United Steelworkers union delegates whistled, cheered and applauded as Humphrey told the convention that the steelworkers "are justified in their claims for a wage increase and improved working conditions."

The Democratic senator charged that steel "has refused to bargain in good faith... and has not told the truth concerning the present dispute."

The delegates voted Wednesday to strike again if a wage increase is not obtained in the near future. No date was set for the threatened walkout but the delegates indicated it would be soon if a new contract, with improved working conditions and higher wages is not signed promptly.

Meanwhile, the USW appeared ready to approve other demands—a union shop, repeal of the Taft-Hartley Act, a national daily labor newspaper.

Child Killed While Playing

GRESHAM (AP)—A game of rolling down a hill in a large culvert pipe ended in death here Thursday for 4-year-old Karen Owens.

Sheriff's deputies said she and her friends climbed inside the crepe pipe to "ride" down a small incline.

When Karen's turn came, the pipe ran off its course and smashed against another pipe. It broke, one of the pieces striking Karen in the head.

She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dean Owens, Gresham.

Shipyard Pay Rate Higher

LONG BEACH, Calif. (AP)—A 15-cent an hour pay increase, effective July 1, was agreed upon Thursday for 20,000 skilled Pacific Coast shipyard workers at the close of the Pacific Coast Shipbuilding Conference.

Representatives of 14 AFL unions asked a straight 25 cents an hour raise but the 15-cent figure was reached after 10 days of negotiations with Pacific Coast shipbuilders and repair yard officials at the conference.

The increase affects 12 different trades.

It does not apply to shipyard carpenters and machinists, represented by separate bargaining units. They will meet later with Pacific Coast shipyard officials.

The base pay for skilled shipyard workers will be \$2.13 an hour when the raise becomes effective.

RUSS OPEN BLOCKADE

Berlin (AP)—U. S. authorities said that the Russians had suddenly lifted their seven-day highway blockade of allied military patrols and permitted a patrol car to pass the barrier late Wednesday.

Interrupted Cruisers Have Time on Their Hands Now

HALF MOON BAY, Calif. (AP)—Ten-adventurous men, women and teen-agers had time on their hands Thursday after 40 trouble-filled hours aboard the leaking schooner Elsie ended their planned half-year cruise.

The Coast Guard towed the floundering Hawaii-bound yacht here—about 20 miles south of San Francisco—Wednesday after it radioed an SOS.

The savagers, unhurt from their exercise, went to a hotel.

Federal Power Plan Opposed

WASHINGTON (AP)—A Reclamation Bureau proposal to build a 230-kilovolt transmission line between La Grande and Baker, Ore., was attacked here Thursday by private power interests.

R. E. Gale, vice president of the Idaho Power Company, and Elmer Kline, vice president of California-Pacific Utilities, testified at a Senate appropriations Subcommittee hearing that the line is not necessary.

The House already has rejected a \$1,174,000 Interior Department budget item for the proposed line.

U.S. Collars Jap Holdouts

WASHINGTON (AP)—Two Japanese who had been hiding out in the Marianas islands for eight years were captured Thursday by the Saipan Island constabulary, the Interior Department was notified.

A radiogram from Elbert D. Thomas, high commissioner of the Pacific Islands Trust Territory, with headquarters at Honolulu, said details would be forwarded after the Japanese have been questioned.

The message said the constabulary and three American officials, including Henry Hecker, of Chicago, who is district administrator of the Northern Marianas, "captured two Japanese holdouts who had been living on Pinnacle Rock for the past eight years."

The Interior Department identified the other two Americans as J. A. Wood and Robert H. Goodrich, both land claims officers.

Fishing Report

PORTLAND (AP)—About the worst luck any Oregon angler is likely to have in quest of fish this week end will be fair. Trout fishing in the jammed Rogue, trout fishing hasn't been good but is improving in the tributaries.

There are streams such as the Upper Deschutes where the outlook is for excellent fishing with many limit catches. There are some areas where luck has been rather spotty in the jammed Rogue, trout fishing hasn't been good but is improving in the tributaries.

The report included these details:

Northwest: McKenzie, Upper Willamette, Dorena Reservoir, Clackamas, Upper Sandy and Salmon Rivers are fair. Trout angling in Tillamook and Lincoln County streams fair to good. Tidelwater fishing is good on spinner and worm.

Southwest: Fishing is fair in all south coastal streams and lakes. Trout fishing is improving in tributaries of Rogue River but is still poor in main river. Salmon fishing is fair and improving from Galice to Savage Rapids. Trout angling has been spotty throughout the middle Umpqua area with fair catches in Tillamook. Water conditions are improving.

Central: The Upper Deschutes River continues excellent. Wickup Reservoir in general is only fair. Odell Lake continues very good. Crooked River, has started to clear. Crooked River at the Cove is also producing nice catches. Fishing in Klamath and Agency Lakes has been slow but several limits were taken at Rocky Point. Wood River has been producing limit catches. Sun Creek and Annie Creek are fair to poor and are inaccessible except by foot. Sprague River is high. Spencer Creek has produced a few limits. Lake of the Woods does not open until May 30 along with other lakes and reservoirs in the Rogue River National Forest.

Northeast: Fair to good catches of rainbow at Wallawa Lake. Wallawa River has been high. Some good catches of large cutthroat at Camp Creek Reservoir on spinner and worm. Fair to good catches in Magone and Strawberry Lakes in Grant County. Main streams in Grant County are high. Most roads are in fair shape. Fishing is fair in Umatilla County but many streams are high and muddy.

Southeast: In Harney County Silver Creek is fair to good for small Rainbow. Sawmill and Situla Rivers are high. Some limits taken from Spring Creek on spinner and worms. Emigrant Creek is fair. Rattlesnake Creek poor. Poison Creek has produced many limit catches of small rainbow. Blitzen River remains poor. In Malheur County Owyhee Reservoir is poor to fair for crappie and bass. The Little Malheur River is high and loily. Owyhee River is producing many nice catches of large rainbow up to 20 inches. Lake County streams remain high and roily with poor angling results.

WASHINGTON (AP)—The government eased its building controls Thursday and was reported about ready to drop its price control over liquor and raw cotton.

The various actions included:
