Indians Voted \$200 Payment

KLAMATH AGENCY — A \$200 per capita payment was voted for members of the Klamath Indian tribe Thursday at a General Council session held at Beatty.

It was the first official session of the tribal government to be held in Beatty in many years, and over 200 adults showed up. A dinner was served at noon by the Beatty people.

The per capita payment, which will total near \$400,000 will be paid around July 21. The money will come from the income from timber sales.

In other action Thursday, the Indians voted against having a member of the tribe serve as "watchdog" over forestry matters, so forestry on the reservation will continue as a civil service occupation.

The Indians also changed a paragraph in the contract drawn up for sale of approximately 51,000-000 feet of timber in the Long Creek unit, next large sale of Indian timber scheduled. The contract as drawn would have put an outside limit of the cut at 61,000-000 feet and the minimum at 41,000-000. Such limits were voided by the Bureau of Indian Affairs, so the contract will read 51,000-000 feet "more or less."

They also voted to recommend to large timber contractors that preference be given Indian labor and Indian truckers who have adequate equipment.

Enrollment matters were discussed and set over to the next General Council meeting.

Ike Says Our Spiritual Strength Key to Future

LONDON (AP) — Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower said Friday the unity and spiritual strength of the free world are more important than tanks, guns, planes and ships.

The supreme commander, Allied Powers in Europe, spoke briefly to newsmen before leaving after a two-day farewell visit to Britain.

"We are going to preserve the peace only if we give great attention to three factors," he said. "The first and most important is the spiritual strength of ourselves, our people. How much do we prize peace and freedom and

Sea Returns Old Friend

EUREKA Calif. (AP) — A commercial fisherman most of his 74 years, Stephen Mersich loved the sea.

The sea is often harsh. But for those who know it, it is often kind. The sea brought Stephen Mersich home after human hands had failed him.

His story, as reconstructed by Humboldt County Coroner Lloyd Wallace:

Fishing alone just south of this Northern California town Thursday, Mersich was seized by a heart attack. Gasping for breath, he was unable to call nearby boats.

So he fired his automatic pistol seven times — until the magazine was empty — in a futile effort to attract attention.

Then the old man collapsed over the engine of his boat. It chugged out, away from the fishing fleet, until it ran out of gas.

Then the sea took over. Just before dark passersby found the boat, high and dry atop a Humboldt Bay breakwater.

It is said as if it had been put there with loving care. The paint was hardly scratched.

The sea had returned Mersich, dead of the heart attack, home for burial.

Communism by name. Eisenhower said that after a year and a half as head of the Allied military forces in Europe, "not only is my heart deeply embedded in making this kind of thing a success clear around the world, wherever the interests of

security, and how much are we ready to pay for it in terms of our individual sacrifice?

"The next thing is economic strength," without which, he said, there could be no military strength.

"Finally of course we have military strength," Eisenhower added.

Eisenhower said that military strength was important but he added:

"We cannot focus our eyes too narrowly just on tanks and guns, planes and ships. Those things alone cannot preserve the peace, and they certainly cannot preserve freedom."

Eisenhower said the ideological struggle was a global one directed against the threat of "monolithic dictatorship." He did not mention
