

U.N. Tells Reds Final Negotiation Effort Made

MUNSAN, Korea (AP) — United Nations truce negotiators told the Reds Saturday the U.N. Communist has made its "final negotiatory effort" and suggested the Reds re-evaluate their behavior in the "tragic situation you are creating."

Vice Adm. C. Turner Joy, Senior Allied delegate, bluntly declared in the 50 minute session at Panmunjom.

M'Arthur Asks Firm Stands

DETROIT (AP) — Gen. Douglas MacArthur topped off a triumphant tour of Southern Michigan with a speech in Detroit Friday urging working men to take a firm stand in the coming constitutional battle to save America.

Still fresh, appearing and firm of voice, after a tumultuous 85-mile procession, the general appealed for resistance to "inroads into industry by government regulation, by tax levy and by political pressure."

The 73-year-old military hero spoke from the steps of Detroit's City Hall.

Before him was a wildly cheering throng estimated by senior police inspector Miles Furlong at 25,000.

MacArthur was nearing the end of a two-day visit, his first to Michigan, and certainly one of his most triumphant tours anywhere.

Thursday he visited Lansing, Michigan's capital city, and Thursday night won an ear-splitting ovation from the Michigan legislature in a rare joint session.

He gave a warning to the legislature of "political conniving" in America which he said threatens the nation with a "military state."

The big Detroit crowd, rivaling that which greeted President Truman here last Labor Day, heard MacArthur denounce Democratic policies in Washington.

Again he mentioned what he called a danger of a "military state" as a result of "autocratic rule."

MacArthur's 18-car caravan made stops at Southern Michigan cities and villages, whose flag-draped streets were lined with cheering thousands.

At each stop MacArthur spoke briefly and warmly, and promised to "come back for a longer stay."

Mrs. Jean Faircloth MacArthur, trailing her famous husband in another car in the motorcade, received dozens of bouquets and eorages.

The reception mounted as the motorcade progressed. Dearborn greeted the hero with rockets and cannon and almost uncontrolled enthusiasm.

The process was held up for 10 minutes while the teeming crowd swarmed around the cars.

During the eight-mile trip through Detroit to the City Hall, Michigan Avenue was lined with flag-waving children and cheering adults.

By the time the procession neared the City Hall the streets were so jammed they were nearly impassable.

In his Detroit address MacArthur reminded the assembled thousands of their political power and responsibility.

He called on workers to resist "experimentation by government" which he said was intended to replace America's freedom with "collectivist theories." He also assailed "spendthrift policies" of government.

POW EXCHANGE

The issue of how to exchange prisoners of war blocks an armistice.

North Korean Gen. Nam Il declared the Reds will never agree to the Allied over-all proposal of April 28. It calls for return of only those Communist prisoners who are willing to go back to Communist-held territory.

Fewer than half the 169,000 captured Reds and internees have expressed willingness to go back. Allied screening of prisoners showed this fact.

At Communist insistence, the armistice negotiators will meet again Sunday at 11 a.m. (6 p.m. Saturday PST).

Joy reviewed the Allied offer of April 28. In it the Allies offered to withdraw their objections to rehabilitation of Red airmen if the Reds withdraw the nomination of Soviet Russia as a neutral observer during an armistice and insisted on voluntary repatriation of prisoners.

Joy told newsmen he made the review "in order that there might be no misunderstanding."

"In return, we got the usual propaganda blast accusing us of mistreating their (Red) prisoners of war," Joy said. "It was full of incoherence and accused us of all the crimes in the book."

Start Delayed For 'Skywatch'

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Air Force Friday postponed plans for the Civilian Ground Observer Co to maintain an around-the-clock watch on the skies for unidentified planes.

Operation "skywatch" was originally scheduled to start Saturday and continue for an indefinite period.

It was postponed because of opposition by the defense directors in many of the 27 states involved.

An Air Force announcement said that a number of state civil defense directors had requested the Air Force to reconsider its decision to start the operation on a full time basis.

Informed officials said 24 of the 27 state directors had expressed concern that it would impose hardship upon civilian volunteers in many areas where lack of numbers would require some individuals to spend many hours weekly watching the skies.

Gen. Nathan F. Twining, acting Air Force chief of staff, said in a statement that the Air Force would study the problem in an effort to "reduce hardships" on the part of civilian volunteers before rescheduling a 24-hour skywatching operation.

Twining said the Air Force believes "it is essential to place the ground observers corp on a 24-hour operation at the earliest possible date."

Mayor Vetoes 'Daylight'

MEDFORD (AP) — Mayor D. L. Flynn Friday vetoed the City Council's decision to put Medford on daylight time.

He said he was calling a special council meeting for Saturday afternoon and was confident the council would not over-ride his veto.

LAKEVIEW—Voters of the Lake County Rural School District will ballot on Monday, on the matter of exceeding the 6 per cent limitation on the schools 1952-53 budget, it was announced by Mrs. Anne Sprague, county school superintendent.

The total levy, under the proposed budget is \$157,166 of which \$57,437.43 is within the six per cent limitation. The \$99,728.57 which is outside the limitation is about \$4000 more than the amount of excess approved by the voters a year ago.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Book of the Month Club has been told it may not advertise as "free" the books it lends to members as dividends.

The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) said so Thursday in announcing a 3 to 1 verdict against the book club practice.

Commissioner Lowell Mason, in a bitterly worded dissent, challenged the other members for what he called "the urge to tell someone off."

The book club announced it would appeal the ruling to the federal courts on the basis of Mason's dissent.

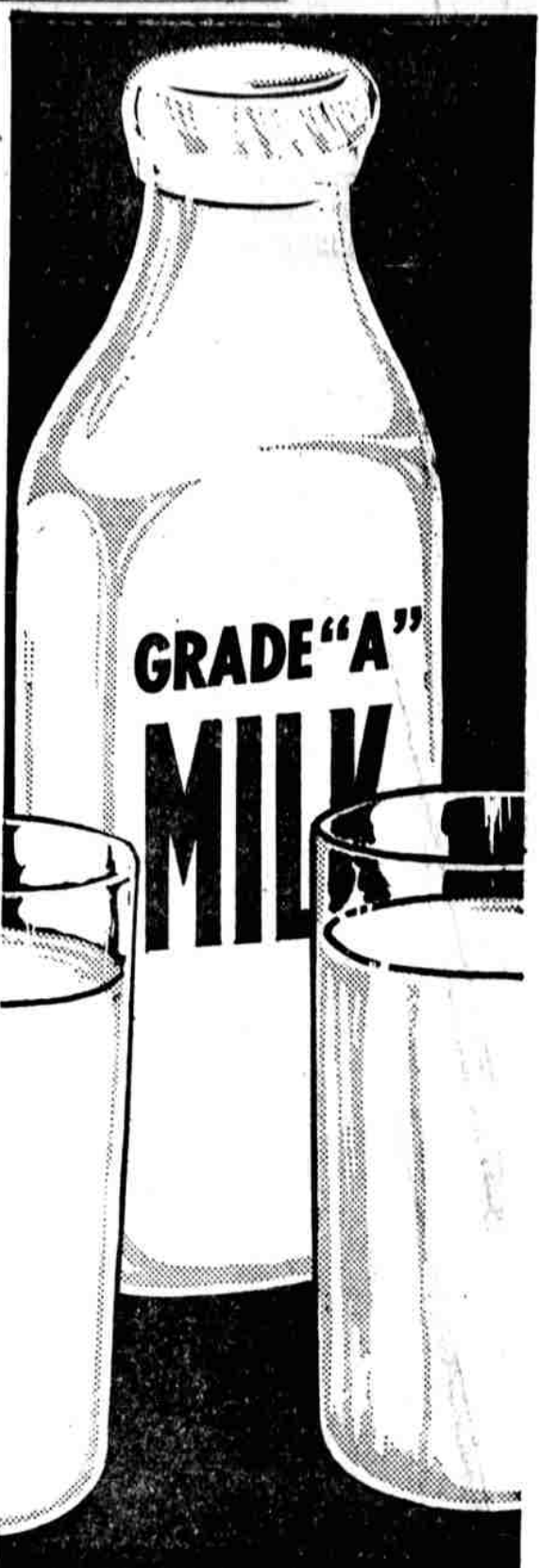


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
