

BEND, PLEASANT HILL IN STATE CINDER VICTORIES

Dick Reeves Speeds To Victory in 220

CORVALLIS (AP) — Bend, scoring 38 points—two more than the defending champions from Medford, won the Oregon Class A high school track and field championship here Saturday.

Pleasant Hill with a total of 67 points far outdistanced second-place Gervais with 45 for the Class B title.

The Bend victory was scored on one first, three seconds and one third.

Medford might have won the title for the fifth consecutive time had not its relay team been disqualified in Friday's preliminary.

San Diego's remarkable Padres, still holding a two and one-half game Pacific Coast League lead, despite last week's loss of a series to Los Angeles, start trying to cut down the Oaks at Oakland on Tuesday.

This poses no easy problem as Mel Ott's charges have been pressing for the top spot and there's no better opportunity than a series with the league leaders.

The Padres needed an 11th inning homer from Jack Gurnea, their 35-year-old first baseman, to salvage the nightcap of a twin-bill with Los Angeles, 5-5 Sunday after dropping the opener 6-0.

In the other twin bills, San Francisco exploded for two from Seattle, 13-2, and 5-0, and Hollywood did the same thing to Portland 16-6 and 3-0. Sacramento and Oakland traded wins, the Acorns annexing the finale 9-5 after dropping the opener 1-3.

HIT SPREE
Hollywood went on a hitting spree to move up with the double victory at Portland. The Stars battered five Beaver pitchers for 18 hits in the opener and then Pinky Woods tossed a three-hit seven inning shut out. Bonus left-hander Paul Pettit won the opener.

Shantz' Three-Hitter Blanks Cleveland, 2-0

Little Bobby Shantz and big Gerry Staley, a pair of first-rate pitchers with second division teams, are setting a terrific pace for the other 164 Major League hurlers.

Shantz, the 5-7 Philadelphia Athletics' southpaw, Sunday became the first American League pitcher to win six games as he shut out the Cleveland Indians, 2-0. Staley, six-foot St. Louis Cardinal's right-hander, became the National League's first seven-game winner as he foiled the Philadelphia Phillies, 4-3.

Shantz surrendered only three hits to achieve his first shutout in the opener of the doubleheader at Cleveland. The Indians came back in the highcap to register a shut-out victory of their own as Mike Garcia blanked the A's, 6-0, despite yielding nine hits.

The Indians retained their 2 1/2 game lead in the American League as the second-place Washington Senators split their twin bill with the Chicago White Sox. A bases-loaded single by Ray Coleman produced two sixth-inning runs and gave the White Sox a 6-4 victory after Lou Sletter had pitched a five-hit, 8-2 triumph over Saul Rokovin in the opener.

Boston's Red Sox remained in third place with a 7-4 victory over Detroit while the New York Yankees and St. Louis Browns yanked a doubleheader. Vic Raschi hurled a five-hit, 8-2 triumph for New York after the Browns had eked out a 4-3 decision in the first game.

Brooklyn took undisputed possession of first place in the National League, thrashing the Chicago Cubs, 7-2, as the New York Giants were kept idle because of rain.

SEATTLE (AP)—Washington State's Cougars, paced by Al Fisher who set a new meet record for the two-mile, racked up 52 1/2 points Saturday in a successful defense of their Northern Division championship.

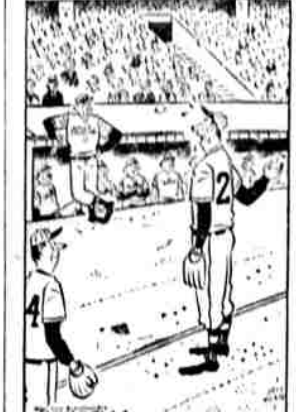
Washington was second with 47 1/2 points, followed by Oregon, 32 1/2; Oregon State 21, and Idaho 9 1/2.

Fisher was clocked at 9:23 1/2 in the two-mile. Dixie Garner of Washington State set the old record — 9:24.5 — in 1940.

Washington State and Washington both took five first places in the meet. Oregon, a pre-meet favorite, was hampered by injuries and took only three firsts. Oregon State had two.

Bill Fell of Oregon started the century but pulled up with a strained muscle; Bruce Sweeney of Idaho, picked to win both hurdles, was out with the measles; Doug Clement, Oregon quarter-miler, also had the measles, and

California Crews Shut Out Huskies

OAKLAND Calif. (AP)—California's oarsmen swept their annual races against arch-rival Washington, the first time in the 42-year history of their regatta.

And Monday the Washington varsity and junior eights faced a shake-up.

Heading back to Seattle, Coach Al Ulbrickson told the Huskies there'll be some changes made. Ulbrickson declined to say what oarsmen would be affected, but he indicated he was not discouraged over Saturday's one-sided race and said he was confident he would develop a strong varsity.

Coach Ky Ebrington's varsity finished 4 1/2 lengths ahead of the Huskies Saturday in 14:48.3, over the three-mile course.

The win set California with Navy as favorites to represent the U. S. in the Helsinki Olympics. The Midshipmen won the 2000 meter eastern collegiate championships at Princeton, N. J.

California and Washington have monopolized the Olympic championship since 1928.

Washington's time in Saturday's varsity race was 15:05.6. California won the three-mile junior varsity event in 15:17.2 compared to Washington's 15:23.3.

In the two-mile fresh event California's time was 10:12.7, Washington's 10:14.9.

Record for three miles on the Oakland Estuary is 14:26.
