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Beavers Slip To Seventh

John Theodore (Jack) Salvenson Jr. of the San Diego Padres will be gunning for his 200th pitching win Thursday night when he takes the mound against the Acorns of Oakland.

And his club is going to need all the help Salvenson can provide. By defeating the Pacific Coast League leading Padres 6-2 Wednesday night Oakland moved to within half a game of the top.

NINTH HOMER
San Diego was in the game only in the second inning, when first sacker Jack Graham whacked his ninth homer of the season. Guy Fletcher, who had downed the Oaks twice previously, was the losing pitcher. Splitter Jurgensen knocked a two-run homer for the winners in the sixth.

Sacramento knocked Los Angeles out of the first division with a 6-1 win. San Francisco stepped into the Angels' spot by taking Portland 5-3. Seattle shut out Hollywood 3-0.

Sap Francisco made it four in a row and knocked the Beavers out of sixth place, coasting to a win after a three-run spurge in the seventh. The Seals knotted it up at 3-3 with three straight singles. Hank Blauvelt smashed a line drive over short that scored Bob Thurman and Frank Kalin with the winning runs.

IN COMMAND
The Rainiers' Jim Davis allowed but four hits in blanking Hollywood and was in command of the situation all the way. Star starter Mel Queen made a duel of the game until he was jerked in the eighth after Seattle brought in two runs. Catcher Bob Wilson tripled in the fourth and scored on a single. Hits by Bob Boyd, Wilson and Al Lyons accounted for the eighth inning rallies.

Customers Flunk As 'Managers'

Yakima had 674 unofficial managers directing strategy Wednesday night but it didn't help the Bears' standing in the Western International League.

It was "fan's night" and the paying customers were supposed to call the plays for the Bears. The evening ended with Lewiston on the long end of a 10-7 score and Yakima still in the cellar, a game behind Tri-City. It was Yakima's sixth straight loss.

Elsewhere around the league, Victoria and Salem split a doubleheader, Victoria taking the nightcap 3-1 after dropping the opener 11-4. Wenatchee shut out Spokane 4-0, and Vancouver defeated Tri-City 2-1 in the first game of an unfinished doubleheader.

Lewiston's victory over Yakima was a personal triumph for pitcher-manager Bill Brenner, who was fired as Yakima manager last year. Brenner went in as a reliever in the third inning and received credit for the win.

Victoria's Cal McElvin held Salem to three scattered hits in the nightcap at Victoria. Bob Snyder, the WIL's top hurler of 1951, had a three-hitter going for the Capitanos when the second game was called at Vancouver and Wenatchee's Dave Dahle yielded only five safeties in blanking Spokane at Wenatchee.

Stojack Clubs, Spins Toi for Mat Victory

Toi Yamato should have left his wardrobe in the dressing-room last night—at least his clogs, wooden-soled sandals.

But he didn't. And today the Japanese wrestler is carrying visible proof of his loss to Frankie Stojack in a savage battle last night at the Army, the first setback for the sleeper expert in seven straight bouts here.

The proof is a deep gash on his forehead. The weapon was Yamato's heavy slipper as Stojack went berserk after tumbling out of the ring twice on the business end of Yamato's backhands, Sumara chops.

Yamato made the mistake of launching his all-out attack on Stojack in his (Yamato's) corner.

A rabbit-punch dumped Stojack at the feet of the ringiders. Then Yamato wouldn't let Stojack back in the ring and knocked down Referee Buck Davidson to let one and all know that he meant business.

WEAPON
But Stojack leaped up on the ring apron the second time with Yamato's heavy slipper in his hand. He found it under the ring.

As Yamato closed in for the kill, Stojack rushed in the ring as Yamato staggered to his feet, brushing blood out of his eyes. Stojack shoved the slipper against the ropes and lifted him for a 26-turn airplane spin.

Yamato wasn't able to come back for the second fall.

FANS PLEASED
Both bouts pleased the large crowd. Masa Kimura and Shibusya Yamanchi, the world's best Juno experts, beat Buck Lipscomb and Kurt Von Poppenheim—and at their own game.

The Lip from Eugene substituted for Buck Weaver, sidelined with an injured knee.

Lipscomb and Von Poppenheim won the coin-toss and chose catch-as-catch-can as the style for the first fall.

Twelve and a half minutes later, Lipscomb pinned Yamanchi after he and Von Pop teamed up on the Jap with every illegal maneuver not in the wrestling book of hoyle.

EVEN GOINT
It took Kimura and Yamanchi 14 minutes to even matters with Judo wrestling.

It took almost that long for Davidson to get Lipscomb and Von Poppenheim in Judo jackets.

The third heat was catch-as-catch-can with Lipscomb and Von Poppenheim scoring the latest fall.

But Buck and Kurt made the mistake of ganging up on Yamanchi again and added insult to injury when they disobeyed Davidson's orders to break up the maul party.

Davidson disqualified the nefarious pair and awarded the rubber fall to the Japanese team.

BEND WINS
SALEM (AP) — Bend, winner of the state high school track and field title last week, Wednesday won the championship of the Big Six League.

The Lava Bears, with 57 3-10 points, were trailed by Salem with 49 3-10, Eugene with 46 1-10, Albany with 21 2-5, Corvallis with 18 3-5 and Springfield with 17 1-10.

Miller Speeds 140 Miles Per
INDIANAPOLIS, (AP)—Chet Miller and his Novi V-8 Pure Oil Special have proved that 140 miles an hour can be done at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway, but their record isn't official.

Miller, at 49 the oldest active driver at the track, hit 140.187 on a practice lap Wednesday. He'll have to do it again in a qualification run or the 500-mile race itself to get an official record, though.

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NCAA Playoff Plans Announced

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP) — Oregon State, Oregon, Washington and Seattle University are Northwest candidates for berths in the collegiate baseball "World Series" at Omaha this summer.

Playoff brackets to determine the Western representative were announced Wednesday by Pacific Coast Conference officials.

And that winner will play the Pacific Coast Conference champion for the right to represent the NCCA's eighth district at Omaha.

The Northern Division champion will be determined this weekend when Oregon State and Oregon meet in their final home — and home series, and Washington takes on Washington State and Idaho.

A split between Oregon State and Oregon would give Washington a shot at the championship. But the Huskies must win their last four games, and they'll be playing them on foreign soil.
