Mrs. Scala is a graduate of KUHS and is the daughter of pioneer Klamath County residents, Mr. and Mrs. Del Fatti.

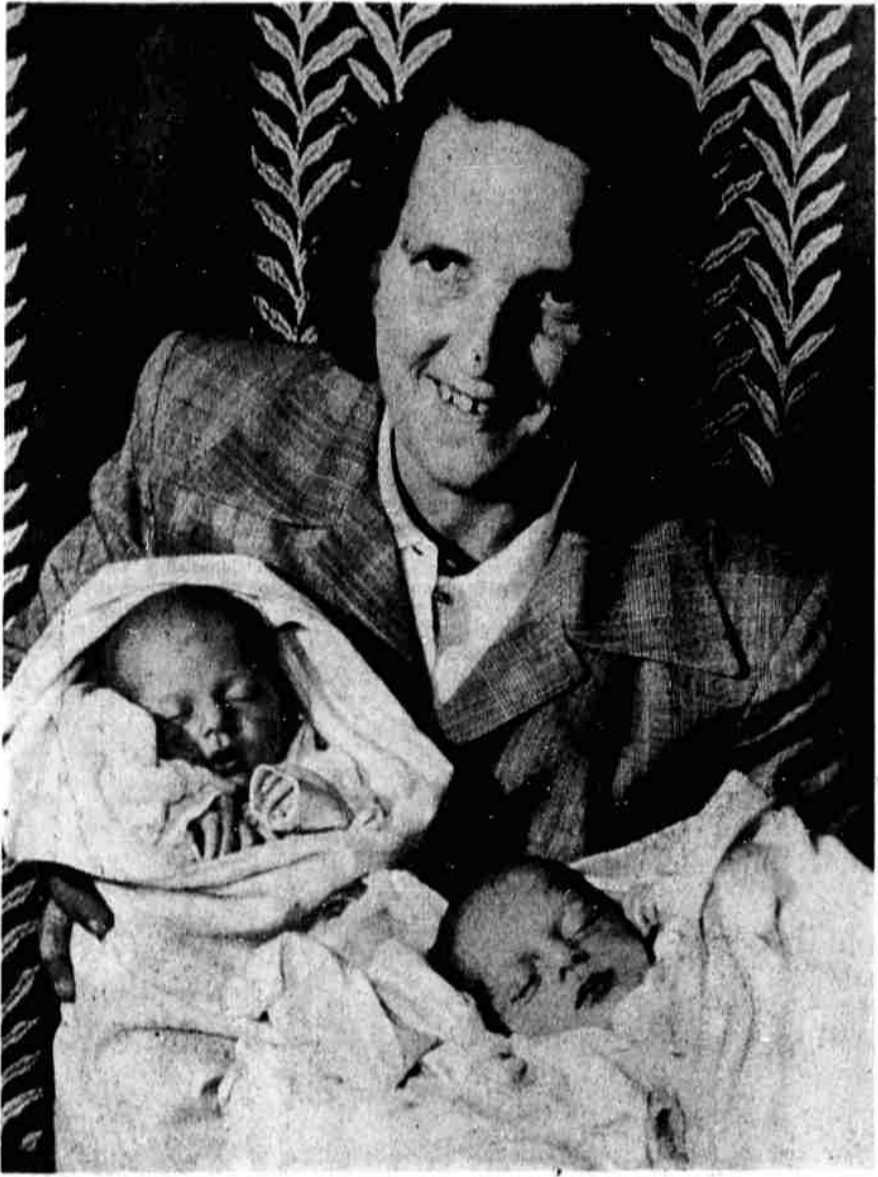
CREAMED CHICKEN

New Dorris City Park Gets Trees

DORRIS—After many years of planning by members of the Dorris Women's Federated Club, a city park is being planted this year to shrubs and trees with lawn to come next fall. Seed has already been purchased.

Assisting in the project are the Lions Club and Camp Fire Girls, the latter sponsored by the club which since its organization has taken an active interest in the youth of the community.

Some 500 shrubs have been planted for a windbreak and fence by the girls who will be responsible for irrigation until a caretaker paid by the city can take over.

The women's Club was organized in 1938 when it was voted and written into the record that the club would continue indefinitely to sponsor Camp Fire Girl groups.

The club has also sent Christmas boxes to all Butte Valley service men and women during World War II and the Korean conflict.

This project took up to 28 boxes a year to all parts of the world and without exception each recipient returned a letter of appreciation.

The club has renovated a large room to be used for a city library and is now completing the furnishings. Four hundred dollars were spent for this last year. Folk
