### Budget Wise Homemakers Use Sauces

Spring vegetables are wonderful served just plain with melted butter. However, the flavor and food value can be enhanced by combining them with a creamy cheese or cream sauce. Budget-wise homemakers will find cream sauces help make their food dollar go farther for they provide a blending basis for leftover meats and vegetables—just tasty main dishes as a result. Just such a dish is Cabbage Wedges with Creamy Ham Sauce. A smooth creamy sauce made with milk and butter poured over cabbage wedges adds food value and taste appeal and makes a small amount of ham go farther.

#### CABBAGE WEDGES WITH CREAMY HAM SAUCE

- (Serves 4)
  - 1 head green cabbage
  - 4 Tbsp. butter
  - 4 Tbsp. flour
  - 2 cups milk
  - 1 cup chopped cooked ham
  - Salt and pepper
- Wash cabbage and cut in uniform sized wedges; cook only until tender in boiling salted water. Drain well and serve topped with ham sauce made as follows: Melt butter in saucepan, add flour and blend thoroughly. Add milk slowly and cook until sauce boils and thickens—stirring constantly. Add finely chopped ham or other leftover meat. Season to taste and serve hot over cabbage wedges.

#### EGG AND ASPARAGUS CASSEOLE

- (Serves 4)
  - 2 Tbsp. butter
  - 2 Tbsp. chopped green pepper
  - 2 Tbsp. grated onion
  - 2 Tbsp. flour
  - 1 cup milk
  - 1 tsp. salt
  - pepper
  - 1 lb. fresh asparagus, cooked
  - 2 hard cooked eggs, sliced
  - 1/2 cup buttered crumbs
  - 1/2 cup grated Cheddar cheese
- Melt butter, add green pepper and onion; cook until tender; add flour and blend. Gradually add milk and cook until smooth and thick, stirring constantly. Add seasoning. Alternate layers of asparagus and egg slices in greased 6 by 10 inch glass baking dish. Pour over sauce. Top with buttered crumbs and cheese. Bake in moderate oven, 350 degrees F., for 20 minutes.

### Shakespearean Actors Get Scholarships 1952 Festival

ASHLAND. — Four outstanding members of the 1951 Oregon Shakespearean festival company and a young English actor who has played in the Shakespearean festival at Stratford, England, are among the ten young actors, receiving scholarships for the 1952 festival. Angus L. Bowmer, producing director, announced today.

Returning for this season with board and room grants offered by the festival association are Bill Ball, Carnegie Tech drama student, Paul Kless, Buhl, Idaho, who stayed in Ashland for the Vining Repertory season third past fall and spring, and Paul Reinhardt, Texas University graduate student in drama and assistant to the costumer there. All three received festival scholarships last year, the first time they were offered.

The fourth member of last year's company to receive a scholarship is William Oyster, Stanford University graduate student who did outstanding work here last year but who was not a scholarship actor. The English actor is Arthur

Carnes, who just completed a season at Arena Stage in Washington, D.C., and who played with Birmingham Repertory company in England, as well as with the Stratford festival.

Others chosen for festival grants are Douglas Meeker, Washington State college speech instructor and professional dancer; Ellis Rabb, drama student from Carnegie University; Patrick Hines, graduate student in drama at Texas University; Michael Onofrio, graduate student in drama at Yale University; Kelton Garwood, a graduate of Ohio State drama department this spring. Almost all of the young men have had professional experience, and all of them are gifted Shakespearean actors.

Rehearsals for the coming season begin in Ashland on June 16, and the 30-day season gets underway on August 1.
