School Budget Favored

LAKEVIEW—Incomplete and unofficial returns on the budget election of the county rural school district, held May 19, showed a tally of 140 votes in favor and 20 votes opposed, it was reported by Mrs. Anne Sprague, county school superintendent.

The vote of one district, Ann River, was not in when the report was made. The vote was on whether to exceed the six percent limitation on the 1952-53 budget by \$89,728.57.

Liquor Case Review Called

The conviction in District Court of 18-year-old William A. Gordon on a charge of possession of intoxicating liquor is to be reviewed in Circuit Court.

District Judge Nick Carter turned his records of the case over to the Circuit Clerk today.

Gordon was charged March 5 with the possession of beer on Feb. 9, and fought the case. His attorney, George Proctor, demurred to the original complaint, without success, and Gordon was convicted by District Court jury April 15.

After the conviction Proctor asked for a judgment in favor of his client, citing alleged failure of the prosecution to prove that Gordon had any beer in his possession, and failure to prove that what he might have had was intoxicating.

That move was also turned down and Gordon was given a five-month probationary sentence.

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The attorney then asked Circuit court, and a writ of review was granted ordering Judge Carter to send up his records of the case.

Shock Damage Laid to Jets

PORTLAND—Minor damage was reported here Thursday from jet plane shock waves, although officials say such waves produce only noise.

The planes caused the wave when they pulled out of a five high over the city. One man said a ceiling in his office was cracked and a chimney damaged. Cracking of a concrete block building and chimney damage was reported by another.

The wave rattled windows and dishes and the sound when it hit the ground was like an explosion. A burglar alarm at a tavern was touched off by a short circuit at the same time the blast was heard. Police cars sped to the scene and considerable confusion developed before it was determined the blast was not responsible.

The committee will decide whether the prison diet is adequate. A preliminary report will be issued soon, the committee said.
