NEW YORK (AP)—Thirteen-year old Jimmy Carrick of Pittsburgh won the U. S. Junior Chamber of Commerce "Kid of the year" award Thursday.

Jimmy, who has spent most of his life fighting spinal tuberculosis, wrote 40,000 inspirational letters to servicemen from his hospital bed and solicited 8,000 pints of blood for the Red Cross. He is the official mascot of the Navy's Seabees.

The award—a \$1,000 scholarship and a bus ride to the West Coast and back—was presented to him at an official city welcome conducted by Mayor Impellitteri.
