EUGENE, Ore. (AP)—Sim Iness, a husky 6 foot, 6 inch Southern California athlete who threw the discus Friday farther than any U.S. collegian ever has, will take a crack Saturday at the world record.

He will get his chance in the finals of the annual Pacific Coast Conference track meet. In the qualifying events of this meet Friday he sailed the discus 183 feet 5 1/2 inches, a throw that will be submitted as an American record.

The recognized college title holder now is Fortune Gordin of Minnesota, who established a record of 178 feet, 1 1/2 inches in 1948.
