New Liquor Chief Named

PORTLAND — The State Liquor Commission appointed William H. Baillie of Salem as its new administrator at a meeting here Friday.

Baillie will succeed William A. Bingham, who has resigned to rejoin the Coca-Cola Company. Bingham was with the Coca-Cola for 25 years before entering the automobile business here.

Baillie, who has been Salem office manager for the State Unemployment Compensation Commission, will take over his new duties June 1, when Bingham's resignation becomes effective.

2 Civil Suits On Docket

Two civil suits, an insurance case and a contested divorce, are scheduled for trial in Circuit Court next week.

The first, Monday, was brought by C. J. Fraley against the Standard Marine Insurance Company, Ltd. of Liverpool, England, and hinges on a technical question of interpretation of an insurance contract.

A Caterpillar tractor owned by Fraley was damaged when it fell off a transport truck owned by the Green-spring Lumber Co. in 1948. Fraley sued the freight company for damages and loss of use of the car, and was awarded a \$5,500 judgement plus \$58.76 costs.

Nothing has been obtained on the judgment.

At the time of the accident the freight line had a policy with the Liverpool company and the judgement was lumped over to the insurance company. But the latter company claims its policy provided for only \$1,000 damages in an accident of the type which damaged the caterpillar, and is ready to pay off \$1,000. Fraley sued the company for the full amount, and also for an extra \$2,500 costs.

He is represented by Attorney U. S. Balentine and the company by the Farrens and Maxwell firm. Ben Goddard of Farrens and Maxwell said that the case probably would be submitted to Circuit Court Judge David R. Vandenberg for decision without any testimony.

The second court action scheduled probably will be heard Tuesday or Wednesday. It is a divorce suit brought by Lyle Elizabeth Lorenz against Claude Peter Lorenz, filed March 13. Her attorney is Clarence Humbert and the defendant is represented by the Farrens and Maxwell firm.

DISMISSAL

In recent Circuit Court action, a civil suit brought by E. D. Isensee and Cascade Laundry and Cleaners against Ervin Searles, Estlin Klier and Marion Grant, and Superior-Troy Laundry and Cleaners, was dismissed.

That suit involved the question of whether Searles had violated a contract with Cascade by quitting and going to work for Superior Troy, covering the same territory he worked with Cascade.

DISABLED VETS

WASHINGTON — President Truman signed Friday two bills increasing pensions to disabled veterans. They are expected ultimately to cost the government more than four hundred million dollars a year.

Truman said he approved the measures "with great reluctance."

Overdue Yacht Contacted

SEATTLE — A British ship reportedly contacted a sea early Friday with the long overdue Hawaii-to-Seattle yacht, the No Name.

The Coast Guard said the S. S. Indian City reported contact with the No Name about 20 miles off the Oregon coast. It was off a point about 110 miles south of the Columbia River mouth.

The Indian City said it was assured by megaphone contact that all is well aboard the No Name.

The yacht in the North Pacific had been asked to watch for the 48-foot ketch which had been expected in Seattle by the end of April. The three persons aboard are Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Wolbert and Gus Olson, all of Seattle.

ROAD TO OPEN

SALEM — The Mt. Hood Loop Highway, which has been closed for the winter, will be reopened at 10 a. m. Saturday. State Highway Engineer R. H. Baldock said Friday.

Aviation Gas Still Short

DENVER — Even though a strike of oil industry pipeline and refinery workers neared an end Friday, shortage of aviation gasoline became more serious.

Commercial air lines announced drastic reductions in flights. Airlines asked Secretary of the Interior Chapman to decontrol aviation fuel in view of the spreading control settlements.

An airline official confirmed the request to Chapman, head of the Petroleum Administration for Defense (PAD). There was no immediate government reply.

The official said he believed the Air Force, which also has trimmed training flights and some other operations both at home and abroad, is opposed to decontrol because of its own need for the fuel.

Earlier, Chapman said restrictions on aviation fuel would have to continue for some time, at least until June 3.

Airlines announcing further curtailments of operations include Pan American World Airways and American Airlines.

Lakeview Pool Opening Set

LAKEVIEW — Following dedication of the community swimming pool on Saturday, May 31, the pool will be opened to the public for free swimming from 4 p. m. to 8 p. m. as announced by the park board.

The dedication, which will be the feature of the big celebration day together with the Lakeview merchants' Festival Day and guessing games June 1, will be held at 2 p. m. at the pool site with Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry as principal speaker and with swimming and diving demonstrations by members of the Multnomah Athletic Club Swimming team from Portland.

John Hanson, is chairman of the dedication committee for the sports day. District officials will take part in the pool program.

Forrest E. Cooper, who arranged for the Portland swimmers' participation, said that the group will be headed by Mr. Hansel, swimming coach of the club and will include Dagny Souza, state women's diving champion for 1949, 1950, 1951 and 1952. Also in that group will be Carol Everett and her sister, Evelyn in a water ballet, state champions in their specialty. Lucille Lilly and Ann Hackworth who will demonstrate the various swimming strokes. Miss Lilly was a finalist in the national championships at Daytona Beach, Fla., last April.

The pool will open Sunday, June 1 to begin a regular summer schedule.

Caterpillars Strip Trees

HEBING, Minn. — Billions of leaf-eating forest tent caterpillars are stripping many trees in 11 million acres of Northern Minnesota in the greatest infestation by the pest on record, state entomologists said Friday.

The hairy, slate-colored worms, about an inch long, are swarming over unprotected leafy trees in such numbers that branches appear like squirming lengths of rope.

In several instances, armies of caterpillars have crawled over trunks causing locomotives to lose traction and halt.

They are expected to become a highway traffic hazard when they reach their full growth in a week or so.

Housewives sometimes find their washing hung out of doors covered with the hungry worms moving from tree to tree.

Sometimes masses of worms several inches deep have to be shoveled from thresholds of homes in heavily-wooded areas.

Despite their uncouth numbers and hearty appetites, the caterpillars cause little permanent damage to trees, T. L. Aamodt, state entomologist, said.

The principal municipalities and summer resorts in the infested area have been sprayed with DDT—all but knocking out the worms.

Camp White Funds Sought

MEDFORD — Sen. Gordon has notified business leaders here that the Army has requested \$3,775,000 to put Camp White back into a stand-by condition for Army training.

The funds would come from the 11 million already appropriated by Congress, he said.

The money would be used as follows: Sewers, water mains and utilities \$2,850,000; land purchase, \$478,000; railroad spur extension, \$415,000; phone building \$27,500; roads \$5,000.

Contracts are expected to be let some 30 days after the Budget Bureau forwards the funds to the Army.

Fishing Report

PORTLAND — The angling outlook is from fair to good in nearly all sections of Oregon for this week end, the Oregon State Game Commission reported Thursday.

By districts:

Northwest — Lincoln County, good on the Alsea upstream and in tidewater, fair elsewhere; Tillamook County, streams murky but clearing and luck should be fair to good; Clatsop County only fair; Mount Hood streams improving with bait still best.

Southwest — Water low and clear in south coastal streams and fishing has been fair. In the Rogue salmon fishing has been good and trout fishing should be best on worms and flies. The upper Umpqua has been poor and salmon angling has been slow all along the Umpqua.

Central — Upper Deschutes has been fair and the Lower Deschutes has produced a few limit catches. Odell Lake Blueback fishing has been fairly good. Some large fish are being caught at Wickup Reservoir.

Northeast — Wallowa Lake has been yielding limit catches of Blueback on troll with worms and good catches of Rainbow by boat and bank anglers. Strawberry and Magone Lakes have been fair and so has Umatilla River. Birch Creek has been good and Thirty Mile Creek and Rock Creek in Gilliam County have been fair to good. Morrow and Wheeler Counties and John Day area have not been good due to high water.

Truce Recess Ok'd by Reds

MUNSAN, Korea — Red delegates Friday agreed to a three-day recess in the tightly deadlocked Korea armistice talks after the Allies' new chief delegate told them "our stand is unshakable" and will make no further concessions.

North Korean Gen. Nam Il, who has been demanding daily meetings at Panmunjom, agreed to the recess. But he demanded that Maj. Gen. William K. Harrison Jr., new senior U. N. delegate, set the time of resuming the talks.

Harrison told newsmen he made the recess short "because we want to get an armistice."

The next plenary session—the 67th since negotiations began more than 18 months ago—will be held Tuesday at 11 a. m. (6 p. m. Monday PST).

As hour after the meeting adjourned, Vice Adm. C. Turner Joy, former chief Allied delegate, left the United Nations Command advance camp here. He expressed confidence "an equitable and honorable armistice" will be achieved. Joy will become superintendent of the U. S. Naval Academy, Annapolis.

An armistice is blocked by the refusal of the U. N. command to force return of any captured Reds who say they will resist repatriation to Communist rule. The Reds demand their return.

Less than half the 169,000 Allied-held prisoners have said they would return voluntarily, a U. N. screening showed.

Harrison again offered to let the Communists participate in a screening of the prisoners. The Reds refuse.

"No amount of effort on your part to distort the facts can shake us," the American general declared. "We know our position is sound."

The hairy, slate-colored worms, about an inch long, are swarming over unprotected leafy trees in such numbers that branches appear like squirming lengths of rope.

In several instances, armies of caterpillars have crawled over trunks causing locomotives to lose traction and halt.

They are expected to become a highway traffic hazard when they reach their full growth in a week or so.

Housewives sometimes find their washing hung out of doors covered with the hungry worms moving from tree to tree.

Sometimes masses of worms several inches deep have to be shoveled from thresholds of homes in heavily-wooded areas.

Despite their uncouth numbers and hearty appetites, the caterpillars cause little permanent damage to trees, T. L. Aamodt, state entomologist, said.

The principal municipalities and summer resorts in the infested area have been sprayed with DDT—all but knocking out the worms.

Camp White Funds Sought

MEDFORD — Sen. Gordon has notified business leaders here that the Army has requested \$3,775,000 to put Camp White back into a stand-by condition for Army training.

The funds would come from the 11 million already appropriated by Congress, he said.

The money would be used as follows: Sewers, water mains and utilities \$2,850,000; land purchase, \$478,000; railroad spur extension, \$415,000; phone building \$27,500; roads \$5,000.

Contracts are expected to be let some 30 days after the Budget Bureau forwards the funds to the Army.

Freight Rates Made Uniform

WASHINGTON — After decades of fighting for equality, Southern manufacturers can ship their products at the same freight rate per mile as Northern manufacturers.

The Interstate Commerce Commission rejected Friday hundreds of protests and ordered a uniform "class" rates throughout the country except West of the Rockies. It also ordered a uniform system of freight classification throughout the country.

The rulings go into effect May 30.

The ICC order did not mention specific figures but said the new scale will mean lower rates East of the Rocky Mountain — Pacific states except within official Territory. Official territory — described merely as the North — will have slightly higher rates in some cases and slightly higher rates in others.
