Dutch Draft U.S. Soldier

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sgt. Geert Hazenberg of Lynden, Washington learned Monday he had been inducted into the Dutch Army and was supposed to report for duty more than two weeks ago.

Hazenberg was drafted into the U. S. Army in 1950. He just received a letter from the Mayor of Ursum, The Netherlands, saying he was to report for duty in Ursum, May 8.

Hazenberg went to the United States from Holland with his family in 1947. He said he took a physical examination before leaving The Netherlands but heard no more from the Dutch government until Monday.

He said that after he leaves Korea he wants to obtain U. S. citizenship and re-enlist for duty in Europe.

Sheriff, Three Deputies Charged with Misconduct

EVERETT, Wash. (AP)—Sheriff Tom V. Warnock of Snohomish County and three of his deputies were charged in Superior Court Saturday with five counts of misconduct in office and one count of conspiracy. They are accused of using the labor of prisoners for personal gain.

The charges are gross misdemeanors.

Sheriff Warnock's co-defendants are Earl "Buck" Weaver, under-sheriff; Lewis Flanigan, superintendent of the Snohomish County Jail, and George Hudson, special deputy sheriff.

Warnock, Weaver and Flanigan, along with Deputies Charles Matlock and Angus McDonald are defendants in another criminal case filed by Prosecutor Phil Sheridan Feb. 2.

In that case, the sheriff is accused of knowingly permitting two prisoners to escape from jail. The four co-defendants are accused of aiding and abetting Warnock.

Easier City Rules Sought

PORTLAND (AP)—The Legislative Committee of the League of Oregon Cities wants the 1953 Legislature to pass a study bill to make governing of cities easier.

Among the proposed statutes discussed here Sunday at the close of the committee's two-day meeting were:

Amendment of the state speed control act to require consultation with local authorities before speed limits on highways within city boundaries are revised.

A uniform traffic code for all cities.

An act which would limit city expenditures for utilities to the amount actually budgeted.

State aid for cities installing sewage disposal plants which also serve state institutions.

Trucker Admits Forgeries

A Marysville, Calif., truck driver is booked at the City Jail for forgery and has admitted writing three checks, for \$12.80 each, and signing the name "Ralph C. Cobb" to them.

He gave his name as Woodrow Wilson Small, 37, and his local address as the Anchor Hotel.

Small allegedly wrote the three checks at a local service station, and after he had gone the station owner notified City Police. Small, located a block away Sunday morning, denied that he intended to try to cash the checks.

More Political Activity Asked

PORTLAND (AP)—Federal Security Administrator Oscar Ewing, commencement speaker at Portland State College Sunday, urged graduates to take an active role in politics.

"For the sins and failings of politics, there is just one cure—more politics; better politics; politics in the vigorous, forthright tradition of American democracy," he said.

Earlier in an interview, Ewing told reporters that what he called the "hierarchy" of the American Medical Association was, among other things, "the greediest group that exists."
