

BEVOS, SEALS SPLIT

Big Jack Bevisson has become the eleventh Pacific Coast League pitcher to win 200 games.

The veteran 38-year-old right hander — he's pitched for every PCL club except San Francisco and Seattle — finally achieved his goal Sunday night by tossing a four-hitter in the seven-inning finale of the San Diego-Oakland doubleheader.

The Padres drubbed Oakland twice 6-2 and 6-1. Although Bevisson issued only one batter, he led the rest of the pitchers that made easy work for the fielders.

Elsewhere around the loop Seattle beat Hollywood 2-1 then was snowed under 12-2. Portland and San Francisco split, the Beavers taking the opener 7-2 then bowing 2-1. Los Angeles snipped a four game losing streak by twice defeating Sacramento, 3-3 and 9-1.

There are no games Monday. The series starting Tuesday finds Seattle at Sacramento, Los Angeles at San Francisco, Oakland at Hollywood and Portland at San Diego.

At Seattle outfielder Carlos Bernier got two singles, a double and a triple and scored four runs to lead Hollywood to victory in the nightcap. Monty Basgall, who followed him in the batting order, batted in five runs. Hollywood's six run rally in the fourth cracked the game open. In all, four pitchers worked for the losers.

Mel Queen and Art DeDuca both won the route in the opener, with DeDuca tossing a smooth five-hitter at the Stars. Queen allowed six safeties — Seattle's winning run came in the eighth on a single, a sacrifice and Bob Boyd's stizzling single through the pitcher's box.

The Portland Beavers led off the fourth, getting three runs on a hit batsman and singles.

Tight defensive work enabled San Francisco to take the nightcap. The Beavers put down a second inning Portland rally by allowing only one run on five singles.

The Washington Huskies, within two victories of their first Northern Division baseball pennant in 21 years, meet tailed Idaho Monday and Tuesday in the final regularly scheduled games of the season.

And the Huskies, who won their last league title in 1931, must win them both to cop the 1952 championship. A split would tie the Huskies and Oregon State's Beavers in first place, and a double loss would hand the crown to the Beavers.

Washington forged into the lead Saturday by downing Washington State 4-3 while Oregon was blasting Oregon State 18-5. That put the Huskies ahead of the Beavers.

A 10-run scoring spurge in the seventh inning knocked Oregon State out of first place Saturday.

The Ducks drove three OSG pitchers to cover in the inning, scoring on four hits, four walks and two hit batsmen. They added four more runs in the eighth.

At Pullman, two Washington runners crossed the plate on Ronald Hall's top-of-the-inning single to shove the Huskies out in front. The Cougars got two men on in the bottom of the inning but relief hurler Dick Murchy ended the threat by striking out the next two batters up.

OCE reached the finals with a 10-6 win over Portland State.

Portland state won third place with a 9-3 victory over Eastern Oregon.

Right-hander Don Keaton twirled a brilliant four-hitter in the morning game to push the Owls into the finals.

Chuck Tykeson had a wild time of it in the championship game, walking nine Oregon College batters.

The Monmouth nine scored five runs in the first inning and never fell behind.

Two Oregon Tech players were ejected from the game in the eighth inning on a disputed double play.

Portland Wins Annual Track Classic, 67-37

PORTLAND (AP) — Portland All-Stars, for the first time in the five-year history of the event, won the annual Portland-Southern Oregon high school track meet here Saturday.

Portland won nine and tied for one of the 12 events for a score of 67. The Southern Oregonians tallied 37.

Don Spinas of Medford won the 180-yard low hurdles and Larry Schweinfurt and Dick Williams of Grants Pass and Duane Goodman and Bill Redder, Medford, teamed to win the 880-yard relay.

Tied for first place in the pole vault were Bob Newland, Medford, Gary McFarland, Grants Pass, and Ernest Warren of Lincoln.

Warren was the high scorer of the meet with 9 points. Besides his tie for first in the pole vault, he won the 120-yard high hurdles, and was third in the 180-yard low hurdles.

Wade (Swede) Halbrook of Lincoln broke the only record of the meet. The seven-foot-one inch basketball star jumped 6 feet 3-16 inches to top the 6-foot mark set in 1948 by Emery Barnes of Jefferson.
