HST Says Fund Cut Aids Reds

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Truman has accused budget slashers in the House of doing "their bit to help the Communist side."

The President declared in a speech Monday night that cuts in defense spending were "a foolish, reckless act" which may force a sharp reduction in U. S. armed forces in an hour of peril.

He expressed hope that Vice President Barkley will be able to persuade the Senate to restore House cuts in both the defense and foreign aid programs and that the peace effort "will not be wrecked for political purposes."

The President chose a dinner commemorating the completion of a colony in Israel named for him—Kfar Truman—for a bitter assault on the House. It recently reduced his defense recommendations from around \$1 billion dollars to 46 billion and the mutual security program from \$7,900,000,000 to \$6,163,000,000 last Friday.

Truman spoke after receiving a scroll from the Jewish National Fund for his support of independent Israel and the cause of peace.

The President said of the House cut in armed services funds: "This was a foolish, reckless act. It jeopardizes our defense build-up."

"It may require us—in this hour of peril—to demobilize a substantial part of our armed forces. Think of that."

The President declared: "There are some people who would rather play politics than give strong defense—they would rather embarrass the White House than to checkmate the Kremlin."

Bull Breaks Port Peace

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A \$10,000 Brahma bull which prefers the wide open spaces of Texas to confinement aboard ship chased a would-be cowboy up a power pole and otherwise staged a three-hour rampage on the waterfront.

With three members of a shipment from Texas' huge King ranch, the bull broke away Monday night while being transferred from a cattle car to a ship bound for Australia.

His three pals were quickly captured. But the big Brahma dove off a pier into the water. Men in a small boat lassoed him, and he proceeded to tow the boat ashore.

Fifty policemen joined the chase. And finally the bull was captured. He is one of 275 blooded cattle being shipped from the King ranch to Australia to stock a big ranch there.

Suit Seeks O&C County Funds

PORTLAND (AP) — Clackamas County filed suit Monday for five million dollars claimed due 18 Oregon counties from the federal government.

The county contends that 472,000 acres of O. & C. timberlands were illegally taken over by the federal government and removed from the list of O. & C. land.

The counties receive 75 per cent of the receipts from the sale of timber from O. & C. lands. The remaining 25 per cent is used by the federal government to cover administration costs.

Election Costs Reported

SALEM (AP) — The committee supporting U. S. Sen. Wayne Morse for delegate to the Republican National Convention reported Monday it spent \$852. Morse was elected.

The committee for Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas for Democratic candidate for President said it spent \$1,345. Justice Douglas was an unwilling candidate in the primary.

Ernest F. Hinkle, The Dalles, defeated for the Republican nomination for Congress, reported spending \$255.

Enemy Hints Of Offensive

MUNSAN, Korea (AP) — Communist truce negotiators Tuesday made a veiled threat of a Red offensive as Korea armistice talks resumed after a three-day recess—but immediately bogged down over the prisoner of war issue.

The prisoner issue alone blocks an armistice. The Reds demanded return of all their captured soldiers. The United Nations command says not a single captured Red will be forced to return against his will.

North Korean Gen. Nam Il repeated his well-worn charges that the Allies have been slaughtering POWs. He referred to the April 10 riots on Kolo Island which were disclosed during the recess. Then he declared:

"The Korean Peoples' Army and the Chinese Peoples' Volunteers decidedly cannot sit by while seeing their captured fellow combatants being slaughtered by your side at will."

The U.N. spokesman, Brig. Gen. William P. Nuckols, said Nam Il's statement "could be interpreted" as a threat of stepped up warfare by Communist troops.

But Maj. Gen. William K. Harrison Jr., senior U.N. delegate, passed off Nam Il's statement as propaganda.
