Commie Jet Knocked Out

SEOUL, Korea (AP)—The Air Force said U. S. Sabre jet pilots shot down a Communist jet Tuesday in an aerial duel over North Korea.

On the ground action was limited to patrol skirmishes. Jet ace Maj. Donald Adams, Mt. Clemens, Mich., was credited with destroying the MIG, raising his total bag of Red jets to 5 1/2.

An Eighth Army staff officer said one of the sharpest ground fights today was a clash at dawn northwest of Korangpo on the Western front.

Small arms, automatic weapons, artillery, mortar fire and hand grenades were used to throw back a reinforced Red platoon. Ten Communists were reported killed.

The American Minesweepers, Murray and Swallow, exchanged fire with Communist shore guns Monday off the East Coast. Neither ship was hit the Navy said.

U. S. S. Cruiser St. Paul fired its 42,000th shot of the war. The Navy also reported that 24 South Korean seamen were killed and 21 injured when the Korean frigate Apnok and the American ammunition carrier Mount Baker collided in Korean waters last Wednesday.

There were no casualties on the American ship, which suffered only minor damage.

Coins Offered To Collectors

Commemorative 50-cent pieces bearing the likenesses of Booker T. Washington and George Washington Carver, famed Negro scientists and educators, are now being made available to the collecting public by the Federal Reserve Bank system. The coins are to be sold for \$2 each, a \$1.50 premium added to face value.

The premium money is to be used, by act of Congress, by the Booker T. Washington Memorial and George Washington Carver National Memorial Foundation "to oppose the spread of Communism among Negroes and in the interest of national defense."

The coins are minted in Philadelphia and are not put out for public distribution.

Persons wishing to obtain the coins may do so direct by sending the amount of the face and premium value to the People's National Bank, Rocky Mount, Va., or if there is enough demand local banks, members of the Federal Reserve system, will obtain them.

Soviet Subs Close to Home

TOKYO (AP)—Soviet submarines in the Pacific are sticking close to their bases in Russia and Red China and aren't likely to do anything else, the new commander of U.S. Naval forces in the Far East said Wednesday.

The Russian subs are the main potential threat to the forces of Vice Adm. Robert P. Briscoe. He is optimistic about handling them, or anything else that might oppose his fleet.

He said it is quite likely the Reds are utilizing the Chinese coast to build submarine pens but he pointed out that waters all along this coast generally are shallow and favor the hunter rather than the hunted in submarine warfare.

Their main bases are around Vladivostok—always have been. They are maintaining normal training operations, I have no reason to believe different," said the 59-year-old admiral, who will take over officially in a few days from Vice Adm.-C. Turner Joy.

Briscoe said it is possible the Communists are constructing concrete reinforced submarine shelters at Fort Arthur, Dairen, Tsingtao, or even on the island of Sakhalin, which would give them quick access to Allied shipping routes.

Briscoe said U.S. ships steer well clear of Red waters to avoid any possible incident.

Counties List Payroll Gains

SALEM (AP)—Curry, Umatilla and Jefferson Counties led all Oregon counties last year in payroll gains over 1950, the State Unemployment Compensation Commission said Tuesday.

Curry gained 66 per cent, Umatilla 50.5 per cent, and Jefferson 32 per cent.

The state's payrolls were up 15 per cent from the preceding year. Morrow County had a 7 per cent drop, while Deschutes County and a 6.6 per cent decline. They were the only two counties with smaller payrolls.

Multnomah County's gain was 12.4 per cent. Its \$52,892,317 payroll was almost half of the \$1,219,551,965 state total.

Gains registered by other counties last year compared with 1950 were:

SOUTHAMPTON, Eng. (AP)—The Duke of Windsor returned to England Tuesday for another visit with his mother, 83-year-old Queen Mary. He arrived the day after her birthday.

The duke arrived on the liner Queen Elizabeth. His wife, for whom he gave up the throne in 1936, left the ship a few hours earlier when it stopped at Cherbourg, France.

The twice-divorced, American-born duchess has never been accepted by the British royal family. The duke will rejoin her later in France.

The down payment coupled with the high cost of periodic payments may make the total cost for buying higher for any unit of time than renting would be (this is why temporary residents should rent), but when the payments are complete the money has not been spent but invested—it is still present in a converted form and can be reallocated at nearly any time. As an investment it is one of the safest and easiest to handle of any in existence. It cannot be stolen nor destroyed by earthquake or fire, since it can be protected by modern methods of insurance. At the same time, its value will remain stable regardless of the fluctuations in the money value or in the value of other forms of investment.

This bit of economic discussion is for the benefit of those poor unfortunate who are forced to consider principally the money problem. But the very thought of "buying a home" is only for the extremely fortunate: it is the same as "buying" a dog or "buying" a slave. A home is a thing with a personality, and like a human personal-

ity, it expands with years of use. As this personality grows it becomes an indispensable member of any family, giving everyone a strong feeling of attachment to this house and its contents—and to the myriad extensions of each person's own personality. This subjective feeling of attachment is a source of much humor to an outsider, one who does not understand the affection that people feel to little things about the house that they refuse to throw out. Little things that seem useless but are miniature wells of past memories and hopeful promises for the future. Living in a house that belongs to someone else is like giving up a part of one's own self to someone else. There is no substitute for the sense of satisfaction that comes from owning every part of one's self, from that corner that must constantly be kept clean of spider webs to the cluttered shelf that was just put up last year.

"This is the real consideration to be made when planning a home. Again must realize that with the coming years his home will grow to mean the same to him as an arm or a leg. Should I own my own arm? Should I own my own leg? Should I own my own mind? Should I own my own home?"

REDDING, Calif. (AP)—Democrats in Northern California's Second Assembly district are backing a dead man for the legislature in the June 3 primary election.

Assemblyman Lester T. Davis of Portland died Friday—too late for his name to be removed from the ballot.

His four opponents all are Republicans. And each took advantage of California's election laws and crossed in the Democratic ticket.

If one wins both party nominations, he will be assured of election in November barring an upset by a write-in candidate.

So the Democratic central Committee of the seven-county district voted Monday to back the deceased Davis.

If they can get a plurality of Democratic votes for him, they will be able to name a candidate for the general election.
