Death Takes John Dewey

NEW YORK (AP) — Philosopher John Dewey, 92, often described as the father of progressive education, died Sunday night.

He was stricken with pneumonia Saturday, just a few days after he was reported recovering from a broken hip. He died at his Fifth Avenue home.

Dewey injured his hip last November when he fell in his apartment while playing with his two adopted children, Adrienne, 12, and John Jr., 9.

Few, if any, men had as much influence on education as that of his time. Dewey's idea was that emphasis should be placed on the individual child rather than on the subject.

His educational methods aroused much controversy, and it took about 50 years for them to gain general acceptance.

Funeral services will be held at the Community Church of New York Wednesday.

Local Dairies Make Change

The milkman won't have to worry about keeping them bottles "light" any longer around Klamath Falls, there ain't no bottles.

Local milk delivery routes this morning began placing wax naper cartons on the doorsteps. Both local dairy distributors, Klamath Falls Creamery and Medo-Land Creamery have converted from glass to the paper.

According to local distributors, this is the first time as far as is known that a complete area milk industry has converted from bottle to carton overnight.

To celebrate the conversion, Medo-Land has planned a parade for 3 p. m. tomorrow starting from the local plant at Espinade and Spring and running to the County Courthouse. Enroute during the parade free ice cream bars will be given out.

The price of milk has been increased from 23 to 24 cents per quart because of the addition of the paper cartons, described as more sanitary and more useful than glass.

Church Names New President

Lt. Col Robert Ellis Key of London, England, today was named President of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston at its Annual Meeting attended by Christian Scientists from all over the world.

Col. Key is associate editor of the Christian Science religious periodicals and formerly served as a lecturer. He is a Christian Science practitioner and has been an authorized teacher of the religion since 1937. He first became active in Christian Science more than 40 years ago.

In World War I he was decorated by the British Army with the Order of the British Empire, and granted the permanent rank of lieutenant colonel. He left the Army in 1920 and in 1923 he began to devote all his time to Christian Science work.

Before and during World War II he served as district manager of Committees on Publication for Great Britain and Ireland, and in various capacities in connection with Christian Science wartime activities in Europe.

He will continue as associate editor during his one-year term as president. His new appointment was announced by the Christian Science Board of Directors.

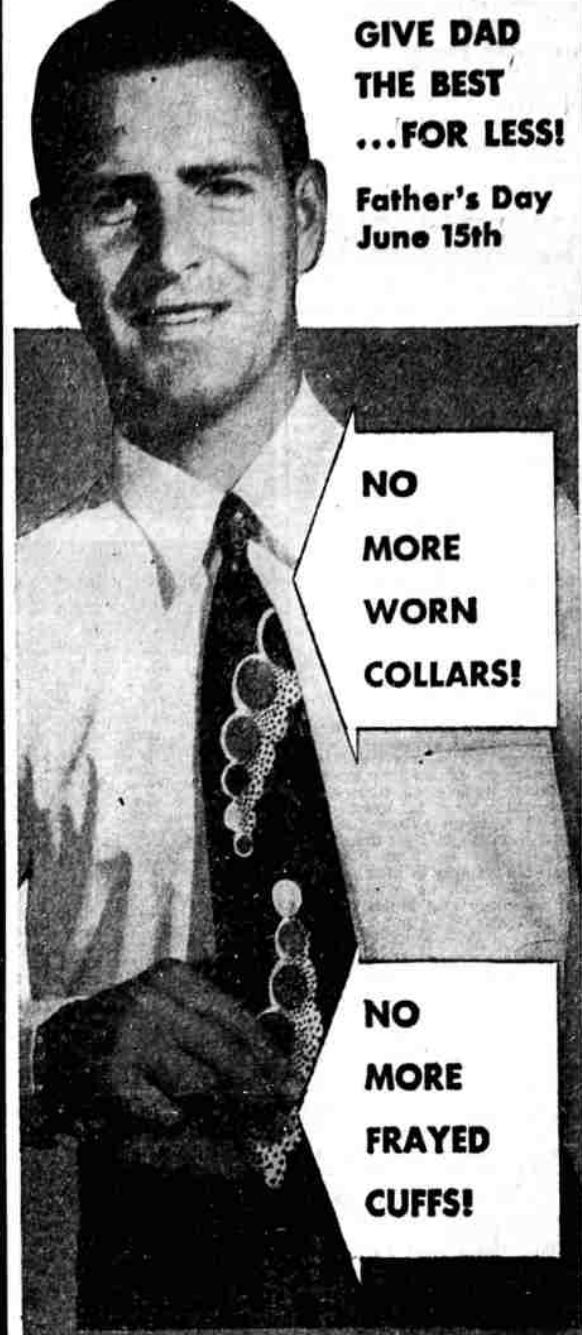
