Tommy was stunned at the news, but rallied gamely and bowed under a murmur to the change ordered by general manager John Quinn and owner Lou Perini. They said they would find a place for the ex-Boston outfielder in the Braves' system and explained they replaced him because they thought he needed more experience.

Grimm, who left the management of the Milwaukee Brewers for the elevation, got his feet wet Sunday as the Braves tangled with the Cincinnati Reds in a double-header and split even, 1-0, 9-4.

Indianapolis Pot Adds To Record \$230,100

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — It was worth about \$43,000 to Troy Rutman and his boss when Troy passed Bill Vukovich's wrecked automobile in the last 25 miles of the 300-mile Memorial Day race.

The 22-year-old Rutman, of Lynwood, Calif., and car owner J. C. Agajanian of San Pedro, Calif., picked up their winners' check for \$61,743.18 Saturday night at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway victory dinner.

Vukovich and owner Howard Keck of Los Angeles were paid \$18,682.18 for 11th place. The check was bigger than any paid below second place because Vukovich won \$15,000 in lap prizes for leading 150 of the 200 laps.

The speedway payoff of \$230,100 was the biggest in 26 Memorial Day races, compared with a record of \$207,650 last year.
