Clark Accuses Red Negotiators Of Masterminding Koje Riots

KOJE ISLAND, Korea (AP) - Gen. Mark Clark said Monday that "without question" the bloody riots and other disturbances by Red prisoners of war on Koje were directed by Communist truce delegates at Panmunjon.

The United Nations Far East commander asserted that the Red truce delegates "directed the uprisings here and the disobedience of" camp commander orders.

of these prisoners here, so they are willing to direct them to do all kinds of things that will embarrass, and have embarrassed us," Clark told a news conference.

He conceded the U. N. has no positive proof there is a direct connection between Koje and Panmunjon. He apparently meant that no radio messages, letters or agents between Koje and Panmunjon had been discovered.

But Clark said: "There are so many instances where the Communist world knew

of events taking place here, and reflected that at Panmunjon and so many instances where events at Panmunjon had been reflected here, that the implications are obvious."

Clark arrived for his first visit to Koje only a few hours after tank-supported American infantrymen moved into two POW compounds and ripped down Red flags and banners. A half hour after he flew back to Pusan, a South Korean officer shot and wounded a prisoner who was taunting the officer.

Clark was accompanied to Koje by Gen. James A. Van Fleet, U.S. Eighth Army commander, and Brig. Gen. Paul Yount, commander of the Second Logistical Command. They were met by Brig. Gen. Haydon L. Boatner, Koje commander.

Clark said "the maximum amount of force will be used to make rebellious Red POWs obey orders."

"If these prisoners of war, who have flagrantly violated all of the instructions, or many of the instructions, for so long, continue to persist, why then the maximum amount of force will be applied to make them conform to the legitimate instructions of the camp commander."

Clark did not estimate when the U. N. would "obtain uncontroverted control" of the POW compounds, which hold 80,000 men. But he said, it would be "as soon as possible."

Clark reported Monday he spent \$3,300 on his unsuccessful campaign for state treasurer.

Jesse Gard, newly-elected Republican national committeeman, said he spent \$2,389. The man he defeated, Lowell C. Paget, reported he didn't spend anything.

Bid Opening Call For Bridge Job

SALEM (AP) - Bids for construction of piers and approaches on the proposed Willamette River bridge over the Willamette River will be opened in August, the State Highway Commission said Monday.

Bids for erection of the bridge itself will be opened early next year.

The piers and approaches will cost \$80,000, which is about half the total cost of the bridge.

The bridge will be part of the four-lane highway between Salem and Portland. The new route will be finished in four or five years.
