Mt. Hood Yield Plans Due

HOOD RIVER — A proposal to make part of the Mt. Hood National Forest into a sustained yield timber unit will come up for a public hearing here Aug. 11. The Hood River and Cascade Locks Chambers of Commerce board the proposal, asking that 145,000 acres of national forest be placed in the unit. J. Herbert Stone, regional forester, estimated the allowable cut from the unit would be 30 million board feet a year. He said no private lands would be included. It would be entirely a national forest unit, established to bring economic stability to Hood River County. Stone said the forest service would require that the timber get at least its initial cutting in mills within the Hood River and Cascade Locks area.

Californians Nail MIG's

SEOUL, Korea (AP) — A trio of Sabre jet pilots from the same California county accounted for three of six Communist Mig jets shot down Friday in battles high over North Korea. Capt. Paul Henderson of San Rafael, Capt. Jerry Lewis, Novato, and Lt. James Low, Sausalito, each bagged his second Mig. All are from Marin County, across the Golden Gate bridge from San Francisco. Maj. Felix Asla Jr., Eugene, Ore., shot down another Mig and damaged one. The other two Red jets were destroyed by Lt. John Moore, Farrisstown, N. Y., and Lt. Robert Bonca, Norristown, Pa. Asla said he was flying with a group of Sabres protecting fighter bombers on a rail cutting mission when a lone Mig came in low for an attack. "I lagged on to him right away and started firing as soon as we were clear of the F-4s (fighter-bombers)," he said. "My burst caught him in the wings and started smoking. I was still after him when I saw another Mig heading for the bomber formation. I swung around, nosed into him and fired one burst. It must have shaken the pilot up because he parachuted immediately."

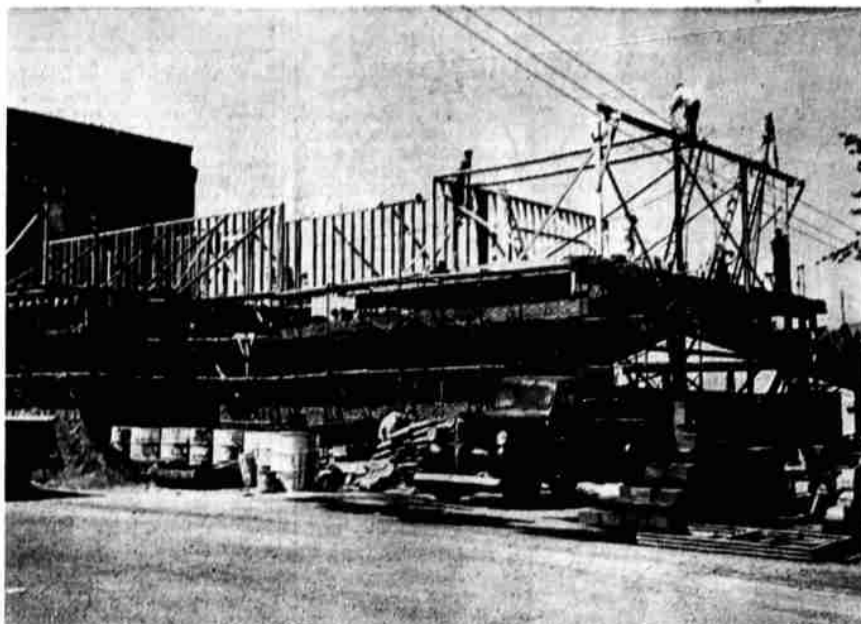
Standard Time For Chiloquin

ASHLAND (Special)—Some 100 reservations for the 12th annual Shakespearean festival plays have been made for Klamath Falls residents, festival business manager William Dawkins said today. This number is far above advance sales made in the city at this date last year, Dawkins said, although Klamath Falls patrons made up approximately 5 percent of the festival's total attendance last year.

Support Down 80 Percent

WASHINGTON (AP) — Government losses from farm price support operations are running only about a fifth of what they were a year ago, the Agriculture Department reported Thursday.

Losses for the first ten months of the current fiscal year, which ends June 30, were \$54,075,000. This compared with 276 million dollars for the corresponding period last year.

The reduction largely reflects the fact that fewer products are being supported. Most of this year's losses were sustained on sale of dried egg, beans, wheat and peanuts.

The government's investment in farm commodities under support programs totaled \$1,609,000,000 on April 30. This compares with a peak of \$4,300,000,000 in the spring of 1950.

Church Merger Proposed

LA GRANDE — Consolidation of the Oregon and Idaho Conferences of the Methodist Church was proposed here Thursday at an opening session of the Idaho Conference.

The Idaho organization includes Southern Idaho and all of Oregon east of the Blue Mountains. The Oregon Conference is made up of the rest of Oregon.

The merger would make the groups' work more efficient, proponents of the plan said. In other action the Conference voted to undertake a campaign to raise \$72,000 for church construction at Salmon, Idaho, and Ontario, Ore.
