### Union, Management Hold Debate on CIO-IWA Strike

FORKS, Wash. (AP) — Top union and management officials debated issues of the CIO International Woodworkers of America logging strike in an unusual mass meeting here Thursday night.

Approximately 600 persons, most of them loggers, filled five weeks by the strike, packed the high school gymnasium for a public meeting called by local operators. Most of the debate revolved around the health and welfare plan which the IWA wants employers to finance. The operators want to continue paying for it by deductions from workers' paychecks.

R. W. Maxwell of Seattle, executive secretary of the Timber Operators' Association, got applause when he challenged the union to accept one of the three offers made by employers in Seattle May 28. This proposal would set up a joint union-management committee to study the health and welfare program, meantime providing a 7 1/2 cent hourly wage increase, three extra paid holidays, improved vacation schedule, and increased night and "hot-est" shift differential.

"If you want to do that the strike can end and the boys can be back in the woods Monday morning," Maxwell said.

James E. Fadling, Aberdeen, chairman of the union's District 3, replied that the union negotiat-

ing committee is ready to meet any time.

The union's District 2 chairman, Karly Larsen of Seattle, warned the meeting should not be used to put pressure on the union.

"I hope no one is serious about using this meeting to find out whether the employees want to go back to work," Larsen said, "or we will have charges of unfair labor practices pretty darn quick." A management spokesman said

25,000 other CIO woodworkers have returned to work under the same terms rejected in the Grays Harbor and northwest Washington districts where nearly 10,000 still are on strike.

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### General Due For Trial

WASHINGTON (AP) — Maj. Gen. Robert W. Grow, whose diary was stolen by Russian agents while he was visiting in Germany, will be tried by court martial, the Army announced Thursday.

Grow was a military attaché at the American embassy in Moscow. The announcement said that the Army had completed the investigation of the charges preferred against Grow and that trial by court martial is warranted.

The Russians made propaganda use of the diary, publishing excerpts in which Grow was depicted as advocating war now against Russia.

The trial will be held at Fort Meade, Md., with the sessions closed to the public. The date for the trial was not announced.

On April 28 the Army announced that it was investigating charges against Grow which included:

1. Improperly reporting classified military information in private records.
2. Failing properly to safeguard classified military information.

In March of 1951 Grow was in Frankfurt, Germany, for a medical checkup.

The Army has said that someone believed to be a Soviet spy slipped into his room there and photographed portions of the diary.

The published excerpts attributed such quotations to Grow as:

"Wait! As soon as possible! Now! Our attack should be directed at enemy weakness. Although the military services are primarily concerned with military weapons and methods, we must understand that this war is total war and is fought with all weapons."

"We must learn that in this war it is fair to hit below the belt."

Since the Grow incident, the Army has forbidden all of its personnel overseas to keep diaries or personal records involving military matters.

The maximum penalty for conviction on the charge lodged against the 56-year old Grow is confinement for five years, dismissal and forfeiture of pay and allowances.

### Seven Enter Queen Contest

### Russ Action Off Japan

KUSHIRO, Japan (AP) — Russian warships and planes are reported conducting war maneuvers off the eastern tip of Hokkaido, northernmost Japanese island, Kyodo News Agency said Friday.

The agency said the report reached the Kushiro national fuel police from Nemuro, on the eastern tip of Hokkaido, northernmost Japanese island, Kyodo News Agency said Friday.

The report said shell vibrations could be felt at Nonappu Point, on the tip of Nemuro Peninsula. Target craft of about 150 tons are taking part of the maneuvers, it added.

Hokkaido crab fishermen are refusing to leave their ports during the maneuvers, Kyodo said.

### Threats Calls Force Move

SPOKANE (AP) — A young Chinese couple said Thursday they have decided against buying a house in a north side neighborhood after being pestered by telephone calls and threatened with broken windows.

Mrs. Quay Fong Chung, with tears in her eyes, told a reporter that the anonymous callers said only white persons were wanted in the neighborhood.

"We've decided it's best under the circumstances not to buy this house," said Mrs. Quay, a mother of two young children.

Some residents of the neighborhood were indignant over the incident.

One, Jack Ruess, said he felt like moving out. He said he called the Quays and offered to do everything possible to help them move into the neighborhood.

A reporter who checked up found one woman who admitted she decided when she first heard the Quays were moving into the neighborhood but that she "hadn't been able to sleep" since.

She said she called the young couple and apologized.

The Quays operate a cafe here. A police officer, Francis Peck, is one of their customers and he started the first inquiry into the matter.

The Quays, grateful for the news and sympathetic friends, said they will look elsewhere for a home just the same.

### Man Injured In Ship Fire

PORTLAND (AP) — A hard-to-reach fire in the hold of the troop transport Marine Phoenix sent a workman to a hospital here Friday.

Robert Peters, 47, Portland, was almost overcome by thick smoke from the blaze. Several other workmen also inhaled smoke, but were not hospitalized.

Sparks from welding equipment were blamed for the fire, which was extinguished in 15 minutes.

The Marine Phoenix is undergoing repairs at Willamette Iron and Steel Company here.

### Secret Plane Burns, Crashes

TOKYO (AP) — A super-secret B-45 jet bomber caught fire and crashed not far from Tokyo Friday, but the three crewmen parachuted safely. None was injured.

The B-45 four-jet Tornado bomber was flown here for testing and evaluation. It crashed a few minutes after taking off from a base near Tokyo.

An Air Force spokesman said a limited number of B-45s have been in the Far East secretly for more than a year. There has been no announcement of their speed or performance.

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
