Systemic Bug Killer Used

An insecticide which is absorbed by plants and which then kills insects that eat the plants will be used on a farm crop for the first time this summer.

The new chemical, called a "systemic" insecticide, will be used on cotton to kill miles and aphids, says the June issue of Country Gentleman. The Pure Food and Drug Administration approved its use after the manufacturer had shown there was no harmful residue left in the cotton fibers or seed, from which meal and oil are made. The chemical has not been approved for use on any other edible plant.

Although harmless to the plant, the poison is retained for a relatively long time in the sap.

duPont Grant Goes to OSC

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—A du Pont post-graduate fellowship of \$2100 has been awarded to an Oregon State college student along with a grant of \$1200 to the OSC chemistry department. Dr. E. C. Gilbert, chairman of the chemistry department, has been informed. This is the sixth year this grant has been made to the college. Richard LaPore, graduate student in chemistry, will study a problem by using radio-active carbon.

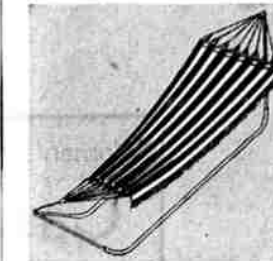

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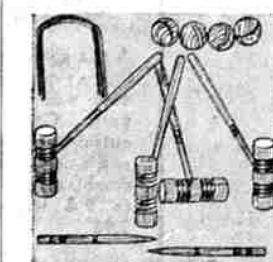
