**Allies Ready Koje Attack**

KOJE ISLAND, Korea (U.S. — U.S. paratroopers used flame throwers, tanks and tear gas Monday in a second dress rehearsal for the imminent breakup of Koje's 17 prisoner of war compounds into smaller units.

Sullen Communists in bloody compound 76 watched the maneuver from their barbed wire enclosure — Criss-crossed by chest-high trenches the Reds dug Sunday.

Dispersal of Koje's 80,000 riotous POWs into more manageable 500-man compounds will be Brig. Gen. Haydon L. Boatner's main blow toward gaining uncontested control over the prisoner pens. Present stockades have POW populations up to 6,000.

Date for the start of "operation breakup" has not been announced. But its imminence was underscored by the second straight day of rehearsal and the setting up of loudspeakers in front of compound 76, which with adjoining compounds 77 and 78 probably will be divided first.

The three compounds are the most unruly on the island.

Prisoners in each have dug trenches around buildings and tents.

In compound 76 — where the former camp commander, Brig. Gen. (now Colonel) Francis Dodd, was held hostage 78 hours last month — there was feverish activity in the blacksmith shop.

Allied officers speculated that the clinking and hammering of metal meant prisoners were fashioning crude weapons.

### Jennifer Jones Hits Too Hard

HOLLYWOOD (U.S. — Actress Jennifer Jones won't be throwing any more punches for a while.

She broke a bone in her hand Sunday when she struck actor Charlton Heston during filming of a scene at Morro Bay, Calif. The blow was in the script but the fracture wasn't.

### Rainmakers Ruining Michigan Says Freshman Senator Blair Moody

WASHINGTON (U.S. — The Defense Department Monday found itself in the middle of a stormy argument over whether scientific "rainmaking" in the Southwest is causing so many wet weekends in the East recently.

Sen. Moody (D-Mich) has threatened to get Congress to do something about the weather if Secretary Lovett doesn't come up with a satisfactory answer. The rain, the senator complains seriously, is spoiling Michigan's lucrative tourist business and ruining lots of picnics.

Dr. Irving Langmuir, Nobel prize winning scientist, claims he's the one who's been causing the damp weekends.

Langmuir said he regularly seeds the clouds in New Mexico on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday with silver iodide and it rains in the East on Friday, Saturday

and Sunday after the seeded air masses move across country.

But the Weather Bureau scoffs at man controlling the elements with such predictability. The experiments haven't proven that advanced yet, said Dr. Harry Wexler, the bureau's rain expert.

Wexler said he and his co-workers have kept an eye on cloud seeding in the Southwest and associated phenomena for the past year and the results are inconclusive.

The Weather Bureau official said the fact that rain falls weekend after weekend is merely coincidental. Wexler said the regular cycle of weather just happened to fit the pattern of the seeding. There was an even more definite rain pattern noted over Europe, he added.

Wexler said that when the rainmakers changed their seeding days in the Southwest the days of rainfall in the East did not shift correspondingly.

Dr. Langmuir's recent statement to the Tucson, Ariz., Daily Citizen was at variance with Wexler's interview of Sunday. Langmuir said his rainmaking experiments have

been proved beyond valid doubt to be successful.

The Defense Department got mixed up in the argument because it sponsors Langmuir's experiments, so Moody took the problem to Secretary Lovett. So far, the department has remained silent.

### Heralds Tell Of Coronation Date

LONDON (U.S. — Scarlet-uniformed heralds read out in the streets of London Saturday a royal proclamation officially fixing June 2, 1953, for the coronation of young Queen Elizabeth II. Thousands lined the sun-drenched streets to listen.

London and the world had known the date for weeks, but tradition comes the ancient court of St. James' to spread the word orally anyway, with full pomp and pageantry.

### School Election Due In Merrill

The annual county school election will be held Monday June 16, in the elementary school. One board member, representing the northern zone will be elected. Leroy Giesler of Chiloquin, and Lloyd Nicholson of Fort Klamath are running for the position.

One position is open on the local school board, as Eber Kilpatrick is retiring. To date no candidates have signified their intention of running for the office.

Polling hours are from 2 to 8 p.m. standard time.

### Sea Scout Boat Overturns

ALBANY, Ore. (U.S. — Albany Sea Scouts, whose proposed voyage down the Willamette and Columbia Rivers came to an abrupt end Saturday, were planning another trip Monday.

Their ship, Jolly Roger, a converted lifeboat, hit a pipeline in the Willamette near Dayton. It capsized, throwing the eight Scouts and Skipper Fred McMullin into the water. All made it to shore, but some of their gear was lost.

They hope to make the trip later this summer.

### BATTLE CASUALTIES

WASHINGTON (U.S. — The Defense Department Monday identified 130 additional battle casualties in Korea. A new list (No. 581) reported 15 killed, 106 wounded and nine injured in combat area accidents.
