UN Calls For End To Red Lies

MUNSAN, Korea (AP) — A United Nations spokesman said Tuesday Red truce negotiators will have to talk business without propaganda or the Allies again might recess the tightly deadlocked Korean armistice talks.

Negotiations, 11 months old Tuesday, resume Wednesday at Panmunjom after a three-day recess called by the U.N. command over Communist protests.

Brig. Gen. William P. Nuckols, U.N. command spokesman, said there is a possibility of another recess "after this respite if the propaganda barrage once again becomes intolerable."

Each day since the Reds have sent a liaison officer to the truce site to demand immediate resumption of the talks. The demands were ignored.

The Red high command in a letter to Gen. Mark Clark, United Nations supreme commander, criticized the Allies for their action.

The letter, signed by Gen. Kim Il Sung, Premier of North Korea, and Chinese Gen. Peng Teh-Huai, said: "If you wish to break up the talks by this tactic, you should do it officially and take full responsibility for it. You should know that what you cannot get on the battlefield you cannot get at the conference site."

Clark's headquarters in Tokyo said this reply would be made public when it is delivered to the Reds, presumably at Panmunjom Wednesday.

Freemasons Set Fete

A hundred years of Freemasonry in Salem is to be celebrated Saturday when Salem Lodge No. 14 observes its centennial.

The Salem lodge was the first chartered by the grand lodge of Oregon.

The program planned for the observance includes conferring the Master Mason degree in the natural amphitheater atop Bald Mountain, near Salem.

Beginning at 3 p.m. at the Scottish Rite Temple, officers of Salem lodge will confer the first section of the degree, after which an outline of the history of Masonry in Salem will be made by R. V. Carlson, lodge historian.

The second section of the degree work will be put on at the mountain after dinner, and a re-creation of the first meeting held by the lodge will be presented in costume of 100 years ago.

All Master Masons are invited to take part in the Salem lodge's 100th anniversary.

Need High For Pickers

SALEM (AP) — Many tons of strawberries will dry up unless pickers can be found immediately, the State Employment Service reported Monday.

The Salem employment office said one of the reasons for this year's shortage of pickers was that migrant workers who usually come to Oregon for the harvest, were remaining in California.

X-Rays Urged For Smokers

CHICAGO (AP) — Twice-a-year X-ray examinations for middle-aged men who are heavy smokers were recommended Tuesday by a Washington, D.C., doctor as a means of improving the attack on lung cancer.

Declaring that there is a higher proportion of lung cancer among heavy smokers than among non-smokers, Dr. J. Winthrop Peabody said he believed such an X-ray procedure would assure spotting any such cancers early enough to allow successful surgical operation.

"Until this is done," the Georgetown University doctor told the annual meeting of the American Medical Association, "mortality from lung cancer will continue to be high."

He said that a definite diagnosis of lung cancer is now possible in 85 per cent of people who have it. He declared the diagnosis may be made early in the disease, even while in the "silent stage" or when cough is the only apparent symptom.

Paper Price Up

NEW YORK (AP) — The New York Daily News, whose circulation of more than two million is the largest for a daily newspaper in this country, will raise its week-day price from 3 cents to 4 cents starting June 16.

Increased newsprint prices and other production costs made the boost necessary, the News said.

British Mailman Supports Two Wives On \$20 Per Week

GLASGOW, Scotland (AP) — A trusting Glasgow wife said her husband slept away from home for 11 years, "but I never suspected the truth."

The truth turned out to be that 57-year-old mailman Peter Miller had set himself up a second home—complete with second wife—and kept up the two on the equivalent

of \$20 a week. At first he used to tell his legal wife he was staying with friends for the weekend, then it was every night of the week.

"But every morning about 10 o'clock, he would arrive home and make breakfast," his legal wife said when Miller was charged with theft and bigamy in Glasgow Sheriff's Court.

"He was a very good man in the house. When I used to complain about him not coming home at night, he threatened to leave altogether, so I just said nothing at all about it," the legal Mrs. Miller said.

Miller gave his legal wife \$8.40, his other wife \$11.30—and kept the odd cents for himself. He might never have been caught if he had not started robbing the mails, to "give these ladies some little extra benefits," his counsel said.

Miller was jailed six months for bigamy and stealing \$112 out of mail packets.

State Travel Delays Told

SALEM (AP) — Construction will delay traffic on the following highways, the State Highway Commission reported Monday:

Ochoco Highway for 10 miles west of Mitchell Columbia River Highway from Cascade Locks to Hood River; The Dalles-California Highway from Modoc Point to Barclay Springs, and nine miles south of Lapine Pacific Highway from Lane County line to Anasut; Oregon Coast Highway south of Reedsport and south of Coos Bay; Wilson River Highway at Tunnel Point; Unity-Baker Highway from Sumpter Junction to Baker; Umpqua Highway from Reedsport to Scottsburg; Coos Bay - Roseburg Highway from Suicide Creek to Pacific Highway; Willamette Highway around Meridian Dam; Wasco-Hopner Highway at John Day River bridge; Shaniko - Fossil Highway; Warner Valley Highway from Drake's Creek to Adel.

Bloodmobile Hours Set

Hours for the June visit of the Red Cross bloodmobile, June 17 at the Armory, will be 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., according to an announcement made by Red Cross headquarters.

Anyone desiring to donate blood who does not have transportation may phone the Red Cross for free transportation. Care for children by trained personnel at the Armory is also available for mothers.

The call this month is for 225 registrations. Part of the blood taken here is used for local emergencies and no charge is made by the Red Cross.

Those planning to donate should eat no fats for at least four hours before their appointment.

Plane Brings War Brides

LONDON (AP) — A strato-cruiser carrying 108 passengers — 65 children of British war brides, 42 of the brides themselves and one lone father — landed here from New York Monday night.

The children, who ranged from three months to 10 years of age, and their mothers will visit relatives here.

The male passenger was Frank Braun, 35, of Philadelphia, who brought his wife and their two children to see Mrs. Braun's parents just outside London.

Braun said he had to stand up all the way — 14 hours — because all the seats were full of mothers and babies. But a flask — "I put away a pint or two of whisky" — was some help.

The plane was chartered from British Overseas Airways BOAC by Cosmopolitan Associates, a war bride group.

The plane also carried a crew of 10. BOAC officials said the 118 passengers were the most a Strato-cruiser had ever carried.
