Acheson Wants Aid Approval

WASHINGTON (AP) - Secretary of State Acheson Tuesday urged the Senate to give quick approval plus a guarantee to help defend Western Germany in the event of Communist aggression. The secretary told the Senate Foreign Relations Committee: "These agreements greatly advance all that we have been trying to do since the end of the war to build a strength and unity among the free nations." As the administration's lead-witness in hearings on the pact, Acheson stressed the "great importance of early ratification." He said, too, he was confident other Western European governments would follow suit if this were done. It has been speculated widely that France - and possibly other North Atlantic Treaty Nations - would be cool to putting West Germany, a bitter enemy eight years ago, in a military alliance to which France was a party.

Smyth Wins Acquittal

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) - James G. Smyth, third of the scandal-riddled Internal Revenue Bureau's ousted collectors to be tried, was acquitted of backdating his 1945 income tax returns to defraud the government. Two other ousted collectors - Dennis W. Delaney of Boston and James P. Finnegan of St. Louis - were convicted earlier this year. A federal court jury of eight women and four men Monday night freed Smyth after deliberating seven hours. They acquitted him of three charges after he and others testified his returns were duplicates, filed to replace lost originals. The nattily dressed deposed collector for Northern California commented: "I'm so happy. One of those trials is enough for a lifetime." However, two other indictments remain against Smyth. One, returned in December, was called "vague" by Federal Judge Alger Fee. A new indictment, to replace that one, was the basis for the trial at which Smyth was acquitted. However, the "vague" indictment has not formally been dismissed. Another indictment was returned just before the 10-day trial started. Judge Fee refused to consider it but it still must be disposed of. This indictment, termed "corrective" by federal attorneys, accused Smyth and his ousted chief deputy, Paul V. Doyle, of conspiring to backdate Smyth's returns. Smyth was dismissed by President Truman Nov. 4 - on charges of "failing to manage his office properly" after a federal grand jury was called to investigate reputed scandals in his department. He then was charged with backdating returns for himself and his wife in an effort to evade \$402 in penalties and interest.

Armed Forces Money OK'd

WASHINGTON (AP) - The House Armed Services Committee Tuesday unanimously approved a \$2,738,218,000 authorization for military construction in the year beginning July 1. The total is about 269 million dollars less than President Truman asked Congress to appropriate in a message two days ago. The biggest cut was 250 million in funds earmarked as the American share of European airfields to be used by the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO). The committee voted unanimously Tuesday to eliminate this item from the bill on the grounds that it belonged in foreign aid authorizations.

Committee Nixes Truman PO Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Senate Government Operations Committee voted 8 to 2 against President Truman's plan to change the way postmasters are selected. The Truman plan calls for (1) putting all the postmasters under strict Civil Service provisions, and (2) taking away from the Senate the power to reject any postmaster appointees. Truman's reorganization proposal will automatically go into effect unless a majority of the senate, 49, or the house, 218, vote against it by June 20. The committee action sends the proposal to the floor.
