Women's Azalea House Long Planned -- a Reality

Theme of the 20th Annual Oregon Home Economics Extension Council held on the Oregon State College campus, Corvallis, last weekend was "20 Years Toward Better Rural Living." Two hundred women attended.

Plans were made for the fall meeting of the Klamath County Committee at which time Eleanor Trinne, new state home extension agent will be present.

Florence Clinton, state agent is succeeding Mrs. Azalea Sager, state leader for many years who is retiring.

Present here for the fall meeting also will be Caroline Shaver, information specialist.

It was announced that ground will be broken in the near future for Azalea House, women's cooperative on the campus toward which women of home extension groups throughout the state have been working for the past seven years. Forty-five thousand dollars have been raised by the units and remainder will be raised by the clubs.

In competition among the units for a plaque to be placed on the new building, honors were won by Hood River with Linn County coming in a close second and Malheur, third.

Four foreign home economic students studying in this country, representing Scandinavia, the Netherlands, Austria, Italy and Yugoslavia, spoke on living conditions in their homelands.

During the sessions, Mrs. Sager was presented with a white child corsage and a projector and screen and case for her movie

equipment.

Attending from Klamath County were Mrs. E. E. Kilpatrick, chairman of the state council; Mrs. Lee Holliday, Mrs. Percy Cook, state officers; and Mrs. H. V. Borton, vice chairman of the Klamath county committee.

FREEZE

Now is the time to start thinking about freezing and canning according to news releases received in the Home Demonstration Agent's office this week. Strawberries and cherries will soon be on the market in plentiful supply and homemakers will begin to have freezing and canning troubles.

Either beet or cane sugar helps to accent the natural fruit flavor as well as aid in preserving their color, form and texture. There is no difference in performance between beet and cane sugars. Either beet or cane sugar may be used to equal advantage in all types of home preserving. The sugar from these two plants is interchangeable. They are identical in sweetness, purity, color, grain size and chemical formula.

For glamour touches freeze whole, unhusked strawberries on cake cooling racks in the freezer until hard and light. Then wrap in aluminum foil and store at 0° F.

CRATER LAKE SUGAR PUFFS

In perfecting this recipe for you, Martha Meade adjusted the ingredients to give best results in high altitude areas. You will find these rich, sugar-coated muffins airy light and very good. Never a failure when you follow these instructions closely and use Sperry Drifted Snow Flour.

Sift flour before measuring. Use level measurements for all ingredients. Sift together into a mixing bowl—
2 cups sifted Sperry Drifted Snow "Home-Perfected" Enriched Flour
3 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup granulated sugar
Add—
1/2-1/2 cup whole eggs, beaten (2 large)
1/4 cup milk
1/4 cup shortening, melted
1 cup shredded coconut
Stir just until mixture is dampened. Fill well greased muffin cups (about 2 inches wide, 1 1/4 inches deep), 3/4 full. Bake in a preheated hot oven, 425°, for 15-20 minutes. When baked, remove from pans and dip (or brush liberally) in—
1/2 cup butter, or margarine, melted
Then roll immediately in mixture of—
1/2 cup granulated sugar, blended with
1 teaspoon powdered cinnamon
These Spicy Sugar Puffs may be kept warm in the oven, if desired, or reheated. 1 1/2 dozen small muffins.
Note: Coconut may be omitted and 1 teaspoon grated orange rind added to the batter for flavor variation, if desired.

OREGON TRAIL BROWNIES

This prized recipe for rich, old-fashioned brownies cannot fail. It has been home perfected for this community. Follow the recipe to a T, use Drifted Snow Flour and Martha Meade guarantees "Success every time!"
Sift flour before measuring. Use level measurements for all ingredients. Cream together until fluffy—
1/2 cup shortening (part butter or margarine)
1 cup sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla
1/4 teaspoon salt
Add—
1/2-1/2 cup whole egg (2 large)
2 squares unsweetened chocolate, melted (2 oz.)
Beat until well blended. Then add—
1/2 cup sifted Sperry Drifted Snow "Home-Perfected" Enriched Flour
1/2 cup nuts, chopped
Mix to a smooth batter. Turn into a greased and floured square pan, 9x9x2 inches. Bake about 25 minutes in a preheated slow-moderate oven, 325°, or just until done. Turn out on wire cake rack to cool thoroughly before cutting into squares or bars. Makes about 3 dozen small squares.
*Note: These are rich, fudge-like brownies. No leavening is called for in this recipe.

COLUMBIA PINEAPPLE NUT BREAD

Sift flour before measuring. Use level measurements for all ingredients. Sift together into a large mixing bowl—
2 cups sifted Sperry Drifted Snow "Home-Perfected" Enriched Flour
1 1/2 cup sugar
3 1/2 teaspoons double-action baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
and then add—
1 cup undrained crushed pineapple (9 oz. can)
1 large egg, unbeaten

1/2 cup chopped nuts
Stir vigorously until all ingredients are blended into a stiff batter. Turn into a greased and floured bread loaf pan, 9x5x3 inches. Bake in a preheated moderate oven, 350°. Turn out on wire rack to cool thoroughly before storing. 1 loaf.
