Methodists Set Budget

SEATTLE (AP) — A campaign to raise \$550,000 for the million dollar Portland area "Forward Movement" was approved by the Pacific Northwest Conference of the Methodist Church Thursday.

The 500 delegates here for the 78th annual church meeting voted approval of the drive after lengthy debate over the allotment for Wesley Gardens, a project of homes for elderly Methodist people near Des Moines, Wash.

Originally \$165,000 was proposed for the project. This was cut to \$100,000 in the final approved motion.

Other allotments were: \$290,000 for church extension; \$100,000 to the College of Puget Sound, Tacoma; \$45,000 Wesley Foundation, Pullman, Wash.; and youth camps, \$15,000.

Church leaders said the area fund drive will be launched in the fall. The campaign will include the Pacific Northwest Conference (Washington and North Idaho), the Oregon Conference and the Southern Idaho Conference.

Plane Down In Pacific

HONOLULU (AP) — Ten crewmen of a ditched B-29 Superfortress Friday were reported missing in shark-infested waters 175 miles west of Kwajalein.

The pilot of the 11-man crew, an Air Force captain, was rescued by a Navy patrol craft four hours after the plane went down. He had a broken leg. His name was withheld.

The rescued man said the B-29 broke up quickly when it hit the water. He said he believed the others aboard were lost. One sank beneath it way before he could reach him, the pilot said.

Navy patrol boats and a crash boat from Kwajalein picked up pieces of the crashed plane.

The Hawaiian Sea Frontier said two of the bomber's four engines apparently failed shortly after take-off from Kwajalein for Guam.

The pilot had radioed 16 minutes before the crash that he had feathered two engines and was losing power in a third. His last message said he was ditching — landing on the ocean surface.

Radford Says Supply Slow

WASHINGTON (AP) — Adm. Arthur W. Radford, Pacific fleet commander, said Friday deliveries of military aid equipment to the Chinese Nationalists on Formosa have been "disappointingly slow."

He told reporters that was one of the reasons why he is in Washington for a series of conferences with military officials here.

To news conference questions, Radford said he assumed deliveries of arms to the forces of Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek were slow because of (1) the necessity for setting world wide priorities under the general military aid program and (2) the fact that production deliveries are slower than originally expected.

Did he think there was too much preference given European requirements?

"From where I sit, I think the priorities could be readjusted," Radford replied.

However, Radford said: "I'm not too pessimistic; we're making headway."

The admiral recently went to Formosa to inspect the military situation there. He told reporters that the Chinese Nationalists have "the manpower and they have excellent potentiality." He added they are fairly well fixed on small arms but need artillery, transportation, communications and other equipment. He said their amphibious force was "very small."

He was asked if he thought Chiang's forces might attack the Chinese communist mainland. He replied that "no, I don't think there is a chance."

PORTLAND (AP) — One college cowboy was trampled on lightly by a Brahma bull and others had a rough time with hard-bucking horses, elusive calves and rained-out turf in Thursday night's opening of the National Collegiate Rodeo Association competition here.

The rodeo, held in Multnomah stadium as a feature of the annual Portland Rose Festival, drew a crowd of 12,057 for the first go-round.

The injured cowboy, Pete Mitchell of Montana State, was thrown in the Brahma bull riding, then his animal stomped on his neck. But he was released from a hospital after examination showed no serious hurts.

NW Bakers Stay Out

AFL bakers remained on strike in three Pacific Northwest cities Friday, holding firmly to their demand for Sundays off — the main unsettled issue in the six-week-old dispute.

Bakers in Portland and Tacoma rejected the employers' latest offer Thursday and negotiating sessions in Seattle adjourned without an agreement.

Business Agent John Lefelman said Portland bakers voted 234-72 against an offer of a \$5 a week pay increase and a health and welfare plan which would cost employers \$8.66 monthly per man.

The union official said the bakers insisted they should have at least part of their Sundays off.

At Tacoma, the vote was 82-18 against an offer of wage increases from 6 to 22 cents an hour, and an employer-paid health and welfare plan.

Rudolph Davis, Tacoma union representative, said union officials had recommended acceptance of the offer but the bakers told the negotiating committee it was unacceptable because it did not include Sunday's off or time and a half for Sunday work.
