Vancouver was tops for the evening with a 19-hit barrage against Yakima's Bears who responded with 12 of their own. Vancouver won 12-5 to sweep the three-game series.

BAT NOISE
Victoria outfit Wenatchee 14-6 and blanked the Chiefs 11-0. And Tri-City rapped out 12 basehits in downing Spokane 12-2. The Indians came back with eight hits. A scheduled Lewiston-Salem doubleheader at Lewiston was postponed.

The contests ended three-game stands and sent the teams into new series, with Yakima opening at Lewiston Friday, Victoria at Salem, Vancouver at Tri-City, and Wenatchee at Spokane.

Victoria's Jehosiah Heard turned in the evening's best hurling job. He gave up only six hits and struck out 12 as the league-leading Tyees took a 2-1 edge in the series at Wenatchee.

EIGHTH WIN
At Spokane, Tri-City pitcher Ralph Romero raked up his eighth win of the season. He gave up eight hits and walked eight but was aided by six Spokane errors. Spokane took the series 2-1.

A pitcher turned outfielder struck the big blows of the game at Yakima. Vancouver manager Bill Schuster sent Ed Locke into left field to replace injured Edo Vanni. Locke's home run in the fourth put the Caps ahead. Yakima tied it in the sixth and the Caps were out the fifth but Locke homered again in the sixth and the Caps were out in front to stay.

Bevos Nip Seattle Win Spurt

Portland snapped Seattle's Pacific Coast League winning streak at 11 Thursday night. The Rainiers bowed to the Beavers 2-1 and evened the series in Portland at a game apiece.

Seattle could collect only six hits off Fred Sanford, three of them coming in the eighth inning when the Rainiers scored their only run. The Beavers picked up seven — including Joe Brovia's second inning home run — off Art Del Duca and Earl Johnson. Portland added the run needed to win the fifth.

CLOSE ONE
Hollywood grabbed a 2 to 1 victory over San Francisco, capitalizing on a walk, a sacrifice, an error and a force play to put over the winning tally in the seventh inning. It was the tenth straight loss for the Seals, who skidded down into seventh place.

Another winning streak was snapped in Los Angeles, the Angels whipping Oakland, 5 to 0, after the A's had captured seven straight.

San Diego and Sacramento toiled 15 innings, before the Sad Sacs won out, 6-5. The setback cut the Padres' loop lead to one game.

HELP WANTED
The hapless San Francisco club, desperate for talent, reached into its Yakima farm outfit Thursday to appropriate for its own use the only two players batting over .300 — Bill Andring, who will take over the first base spot, and Gette Klingler, who will replace Bill McCawley in center field.

Yakima is in last place in the Western International League standing and the Seals are only one game out of the Coast League basement.

Five PCC Schools Suspected Cheats

PORTLAND — The Pacific Coast Conference, winding up its most militant meeting in years, cited five more schools Thursday for suspected violations of the purity code.

That brought to seven the number of cases reported in the annual summer meeting of conference officials. Commissioner Victor Schmidt said three of them were flagrant violations by coaching staff members, and presidents of their schools were told to discipline the transgressors.

The officials took even more far-reaching action in the five-day meeting. They told Schmidt to hire all the investigators he needs to run down athletes, coaches or any others who violate the conference code on recruiting and subsidization.

WARNING
They also warned college booster clubs to have their books ready for investigation by the conference, which wants to make sure these clubs operate in the open hereafter and within limits of the code.

Schmidt followed conference policy in refusing to disclose details of the violations reported Thursday. He said only that all are considered flagrant, although four of the seven that came up at the meeting still are to be investigated by presidents of the schools involved. The presidents will report later on what action is taken.

TELEVISION
In the final day officials reaffirmed approval of NCAA television policy, which in general allows a team to opt on live television one of its games in the season. Exceptions are possible for night games or sell-out. There is no limit on delayed telecasts, which cannot be broadcast until Monday following a game.

New Jersey Pro Gets Open Lead With Hogan Trailing One Stroke

DALLAS (AP) — Bespoke, balding Al Brosch, 40-year-old teaching pro from Garden City, N.J., fired a subpar 68 to take the lead in the opening round of the 32nd National Open Golf championships Thursday.

That was one of two sub-par rounds manufactured by the field of 162 in the first day of play on the lush, blanketed Northwood Course. Ben Hogan, the defending champion and winner of three national open titles in his last three attempts, had a 69.

Three others fired even par 70's. They were Sam Snead, one of the three top favorites in pre-tournament reckoning; 44-year-old Horton Smith, the PGA president, and Dick Metz.

TOUGH GOING
None of the others could buck the combination of 94-degree heat, strong winds and the pressure of playing in a national championship before a huge opening-day crowd estimated at 12,000.

The 71 shooters on the opening day, which saw scores skyrocket as high as 91, included Porky Oliver, Dutch Harrison, George Fazio, Ted Kroll and Julius Boros.

Another was Stan Mosel, the North Texas State College sophomore from Twin Falls, Idaho, the only amateur to crash the list of leaders.

At Zimmerman of Portland, Ore., had a 78, and Bob McKendrick, Oswego, Ore., an 84.

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Duke Dunks OSC, 18-7

OMAHA (AP) — Unless there are a couple of surprises, that foxy old major leaguer Jack Coombs is going to retire with the realization of his fondest dream — an NCAA baseball championship.

The former Philadelphia Athletics hurler is leaving Duke University this season at the age of 70. He wants the NCAA title as a climax to his 32 years of coaching.

On strength of their performance in beating Oregon State 18-7 in the first round, Thursday, the Blue Devils appear ready and able to satisfy their coach.

Anxious to confound the railbirds in the double elimination affair were Missouri, Holy Cross and Penn State in the winners' bracket and Texas, Western Michigan, Colorado State and Oregon State in the losers' bracket.

Oregon State stirred hopes for an upset Thursday by clouting Duke's ace Joe Lewis for six runs and a 6-4 lead in the second inning. But the potency of Duke's attack smashed state in the end.

Texas, defeated by Penn State, makes its comeback bid against Oregon State Friday.
