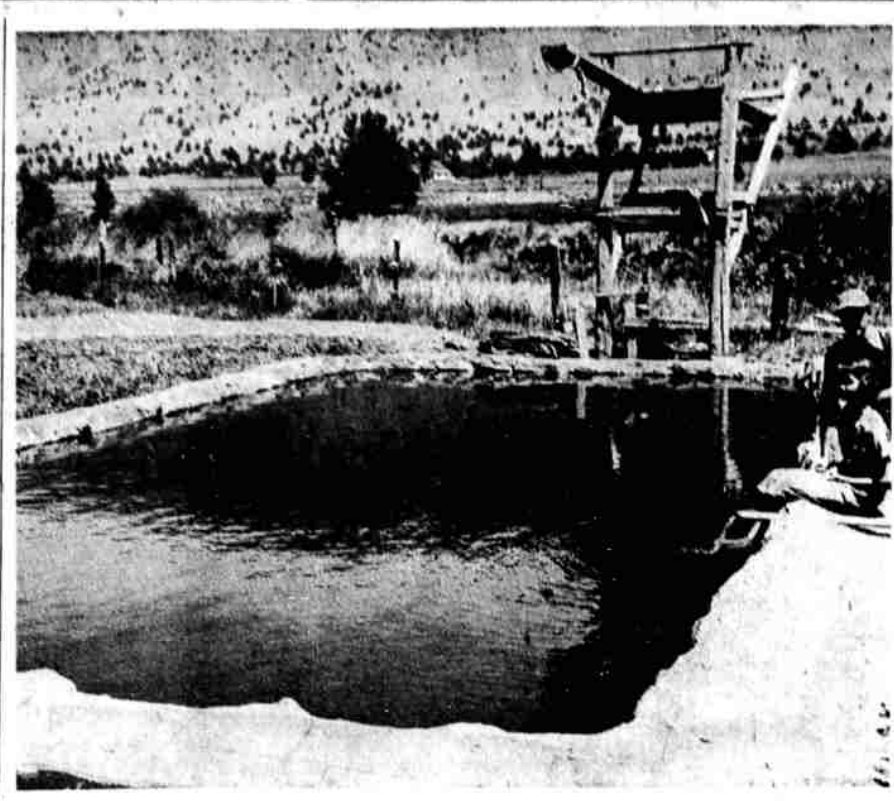

## Soviet Diplomatic Changes Seen As Appeal to British

MOSCOW (AP)—The appointment of Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Andre A. Gromyko as Russia's ambassador to Britain Saturday was interpreted here as a highly significant move intended to stress to Britain and the rest of the world the importance of Soviet-British diplomatic relations.

Some Western observers said the placing of one of the Soviet's top diplomats in London at this time means Russia hopes for improved relations with Britain by appealing to British "neutrality" in the cold war. The tactic was interpreted as a move to split Britain from her Western Allies by cashing in on sentiment expressed by leftwing Labor Leader Aneurin Bevan, who wants to steer a separate course away from U. S. defense policies.

A major new phase in Soviet diplomacy appeared definitely in the making. The sudden shifts of major ambassadorial personnel in key world centers in the past few days foretold, perhaps, important things to come. The personnel changes were likened to the re-

## Russian-Venezuelan Relations Broken Off

MOSCOW (AP)—Russian announced Saturday that she has broken off diplomatic relations with Venezuela.

A Soviet government statement published in all newspapers here said Russian diplomatic personnel in Caracas have been recalled. Venezuelan Charge D'Affaires Luis Carrasquero has been ordered to leave Russia.

The statement said that Venezuelan authorities arrested a Soviet embassy employe and his wife when they arrived in Caracas recently and expelled them from the country despite the protest of the Soviet Charge d'Affaires, L. V. Krylov.

The Russian announcement also claimed that Venezuelan authorities committed hoodlun actions against Krylov.

The Venezuelan government announced Friday night that it had severed relations with Moscow.

Caracas officials gave the following version of the incident that led to the rupture.

Two Russians, Nikolai Yagouchev and his wife Alexandra, arrived Saturday from Mexico City. They claimed to be domestic servants at the Soviet embassy but their special passports listed them as couriers.

Venezuela protested to Moscow charging the two diplomats with "violent, aggressive and disrespectful action" and demanded their immediate recall.

Venezuelan Foreign Minister Luis Emilio Gomez Ruiz said Russia had refused to receive the protest.

## Wives Get Ship Started

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—The big passenger liner President Cleveland will steam out of San Francisco harbor Tuesday for the Orient because two Army wives, both expectant mothers, told the boss of the striking west coast AFL sailors.

"There is no time to be lost if we are to join our husbands overseas before our babies are born," the liner, managed by AFL sailors, arrived here Friday from the Far East. Its scheduled Tuesday sailing was expected to be cancelled because of the 29-day-old maritime strike.

But the two women, Mrs. Dolores Marshall of Boston, and Mrs. Jessie T. Blanford of Detroit, appealed personally to Union Chief Harry Lundberg. The women's husbands, both warrant officers, are stationed in Yokohama, Japan.

Lundberg referred the request to the union's strike committee. The committee voted unanimously to clear the sailing.

Some 60 ships in west coast ports have been dock-bound because of the strike. The union is demanding a 5 per cent wage boost, overtime pay for Saturday work at sea, and the right to cancel any contract with the Pacific Maritime Association on 60-day notice.

## Morse Favors Hell's Canyon

WASHINGTON (AP)—Opponents of Hells Canyon Dam were accused by Sen. Morse (R-Or.) of using "misrepresentations, half-truths and outright distortions" to stall construction of the huge Snake River project on the Idaho-Oregon border.

In a 15,000-word speech Friday, the Oregon Senator said the Idaho Power Co. and other opposition witnesses advocated "absolutely contradictory proposals" during testimony before a House interior sub-committee in April.

The subcommittee is to resume hearings on the \$57 million dollar project next week.

Morse is the sponsor of a Senate bill to authorize the combination power and flood control project. It is opposed by the Idaho Power Co. on grounds it would flood out five sites where the company proposes to build low level dams.

Morse labeled as "groundless" contentions that adequate water is not available to make Hells Canyon feasible or that the structure would endanger future water rights.

He argued that the Idaho Power Company's power projects "would depend to a much greater extent than Hells Canyon, upon continuation of flow during the irrigation."

## Olympic Drive Starts

PORTLAND (AP)—A campaign for funds to help pay expenses of the American team to the Olympic games in Helsinki, Finland, opens in Oregon Monday.

Gov. Douglas McKay, honorary campaign chairman, said he had been advised that about a half million dollars still is needed to finance the trip for 425 U. S. men and women who will compete.

Banks in all Oregon cities will accept contributions under arrangements made with the Oregon Bankers' Association, McKay said. E. C. Sammons, president of the United States National Bank, Portland, is treasurer for the Oregon fund.

## Floods Held By Reservoirs

PORTLAND (AP)—Reservoirs which controlled the heavy spring runoffs, saved the Pacific Northwest from costly floods, a Columbia Basin Inter-Agency Committee spokesman reported Friday.

F. A. Banks, chairman of the water management subcommittee which co-ordinates operation of the reservoirs, said Bureau of Reclamation reservoirs averted major flooding in the Boise and Upper Snake River Basins.

Upstream storage reduced flow in the Columbia River at the Dalles to 35,000 cubic feet a second, he said. That kept the Columbia and Willamette in the Portland-Vancouver area a foot lower than would have been otherwise and damage to water-tight installations was held to a minimum.

## Vittorio Critical of Star's Efforts in Love Scenes

## Vote Due On Tidelands

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate may vote next Thursday whether to override President Truman's veto of a bill to give the states clear title to the oil-rich lands off their coastlines.

Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson (D-Tex.), acting majority leader, announced Friday he would seek to call up the veto for discussion Wednesday and a vote Thursday. Whether this schedule is carried out, he added, depends on the approval of Sen. O'Mahoney (D-Wyo.) leader of the forces seeking to uphold the veto, and Sen. Holland (D-Pa.), whose forces want to override it.

The big fight over the measure, often called the Tidelands Bill, was expected to come in the Senate. It was generally predicted that the house could muster the necessary two-thirds vote of members present to override the veto. The count was expected to be a tight squeeze either way in the Senate.
