The members of the Klamath Art Association are rushing about like mad these days making plans for their coming Summer Art Workshop—attending art shows and corresponding with people in far places who anticipate attending the summer session.

Last week Dorothy Sutcliffe and myself met in San Francisco where we attended the Henri Matisse exhibit. This is the largest one-man-show ever to be given for a living artist. Since Matisse is considered one of the greatest living painters, and by some, including myself, the greatest living painter, the show is, by far, one of the most important to come to the West coast in many years.

The exhibit contains paintings from private art collections of people throughout the country including over seventy owned in the bay area alone. Thus, one was able to see for the first time paintings that are not usually available to the public.

The scope of the man's work was breathtaking. The techniques

can gain a better knowledge of the artist's view of the paintings. Louis Bunce, who will be the painting instructor here this summer for the Art Workshop, plans to stop over this weekend in Klamath Falls en route from San Francisco where he was attending the Matisse show. He plans to discuss plans for the summer school with the Art Association members and select the outdoor locations where the class will go to paint.

The Summer Art Workshop will be held on the OTT campus from July 7 to August 1 and the classes are for both beginners, advanced students and teachers. A total of six graduate college credits may be earned during the month of school.

People were in attendance from all parts of the country and the whole city of San Francisco was Matisse conscious. The show will last until July 5 and any of you who are planning a trip to San Francisco must surely plan to attend. There are many explanatory notes mounted on the walls throughout the rooms, reference books on the table, and a gallery tour each day at three so that the non-artist
