Federal Power Commission Studies Gas Importation

WASHINGTON (AP)—Is it feasible to import natural gas from Canada into the Pacific Northwest?

The Federal Power Commission started out to find the answer to that question, along with others, Monday in a consolidated hearing on eight applications involving both the import and export of natural gas.

Five of the eight companies want to bring natural gas to the Oregon-Washington-Idaho-Montana area for the first time. They are West-

coast Transmission Co., Inc., Wilmington, Del.; Trans-Northwest Gas, Inc., Spokane, Wash.; North-west Natural Gas Co., New York; Pacific Northwest Pipeline Corp., Houston, Tex.; and Glacier Gas Co., Butte, Mont.

A sixth—Northern Natural Gas Company, Omaha, Neb.—wants to build a 400-mile pipeline from the border to a point near Minneapolis-St. Paul for Midwest market areas. It would cost an estimated 24 1/2 million dollars.

Two other companies—Tennessee Gas Transmission Co., Houston, Tex., and Niagara Gas Transmission Ltd., Toronto, Canada—have filed joint applications to export natural gas from Gulf Coast fields to Toronto and other Eastern Ontario markets.

All the natural gas involved would come from fields in Alberta. Several of the plans would pipe part of the gas back into British Columbia after passing through the Northwest.

Largest of the import proposals is that of Northwest Natural. It proposes a 645 mile main pipeline

pipeline to supply markets in Oregon and Washington. The project, costing about 25 million dollars, would have a designed capacity of 221 million cubic feet daily in the fifth year of operation.

Cost estimates were not included in the applications of Glacier, which would carry a maximum of 25 billion cubic feet annually over a 626-mile pipeline in Montana, Idaho and Washington, or for Trans-Northwest. The latter would buy gas from Westcoast for service to Eastern Washington points.

Repairs Due Lumber Ship

BANDON, Ore. (AP)—The twice-grounded lumber schooner Cynthia Olson was refloated Sunday and towed to a dock for temporary repairs.

The ship ran into a sand bar at the mouth of this Southern Oregon harbor June 7. A hole was punched in its bottom as high waves bounced it on the bar. Three million board feet of lumber were jettisoned to lighten the vessel. The Cynthia Olson was pulled off the bar the following night, only to go aground again a few hundred feet up the harbor channel. Salvage crews patched the hole and had enough water pumped out Sunday to refloat the ship so it could be towed to a dock here.

UN Negotiators Again Blast Communist Leaders

MUNSAN, Korea (AP)—The senior United Nations truce negotiator Monday charged the Communists with responsibility for Red prisoner of war riots and for continuing "a bloody and profitless war."

Maj. Gen. William K. Harrison accused the Red delegates at a fruitless 22-minute session of directing "your captured personnel at Kojin Island to endanger their lives to further your nefarious schemes."

Hundreds of captured Reds have been killed or wounded on Kojin in Communist led riots.

The key issue blocking a truce is the U. N. Stand that no prisoner be forcibly repatriated. Only 70,000 of 169,000 captured Reds have expressed willingness to return to Red rule.

Harrison said refusal of the Reds to accept this stand was incomprehensible. He added: "You must realize that you are choosing between an honorable armistice and the continuation of a bloody and profitless conflict."

North Korean Gen. Nam Il replied in stiffened tones. He accused the U. N. of "incessant atrocities" and "slaughtering" of war prisoners. It was the first time in five days he had repeated these charges.

Nam brushed aside Harrison's suggestion that a recess be held to give the Reds "time to reconsider your untenable decision."

Nam II said he wanted to meet again Tuesday. Harrison agreed to meet at 11 a.m. (6 p.m. Monday PST).

Field Marshal Lord Alexander, Britain's defense minister, was asked at a news conference in Seoul Sunday what chances the truce talks had to succeed. He replied: "I wouldn't bet one way or another. It's a tossup as far as I can see. I honestly do not know whether the Communists are sincere."

Cake Predicts Ike Will Win

PORTLAND (AP)—General Dwight Eisenhower will be elected Republican presidential candidate on the third ballot at the GOP convention at Chicago next month, Oregon Republican National Committeeman Ralph Cake said Saturday.

Cake made the prediction on his return from meeting in the east with other Eisenhower supporters.

General Douglas MacArthur, keynote speaker, will gain some of the support now pledged to Sen. Robert A. Taft of Ohio, Cake said.

He also predicted that some of the votes Taft gets on the first ballot later will be switched to Eisenhower.

PORTLAND (AP)—State Treasurer Walter J. Pearson, back in Oregon after a trip to the east where he arranged for the sale of the state's veterans bonus bonds, said he had invested 25 million dollars from the sale in U. S. Treasury bonds.

The remainder of the \$44,977,256.55 he transferred equally to the First National and U. S. National Banks of Portland, he said. Bonus checks, some of which will go in the mail to Oregon veterans this week, are expected to average about \$415 each.
