

Koje POWs Shifted

KOJE ISLAND, Korea (AP)—Four big prisoners of war pens were emptied Tuesday of 22,500 Chinese and North Korean Communist POWs. The only excitement was provided by two POWs who broke ranks to get away from Red prisoner leaders.

Eleven thousand North Koreans were to remain out of compounds 92 and 96 only long enough for American guards to search the stockades for weapons and escape tunnels.

About 5,000 Chinese from 602 and 600 North Koreans from adjoining 603 were dispersed to new smaller units housing about 500 each.

The Chinese sang lustily to their own string music and handed Brig. Gen. Haydon L. Boatner, Kojé commander, a present: A miniature tank fashioned out of ration cans.

Boatner has used the threat of tanks frequently in the past few weeks in gaining unopposed control over the island's 80,000 prisoners.

The Chinese eventually will be sent to Cheju Island off South Korea. About two months ago 15,000 Chinese POWs who do not want to return to Red rule were transferred to Cheju.

Boatner plans to move a total of 30,000 POWs from Kojé to other islands.

More than 11,000 North Koreans in compounds 65 and 603 will be sent on Wednesday.

Prior to Tuesday's movement, Boatner had broken up six other compounds holding 38,000 Reds. He expects to complete the dispersal of untidy prisoners into smaller units by the end of the week.

He told a group of some 70 of his Southern California delegates and alternates Monday night that the nominee could be determined on the first ballot, or "it could drag on to 30 or 40 ballots. We might well hold the balance of power."

U.S. Eases Copper Controls

WASHINGTON (AP)—The government Tuesday announced a big increase in copper allocations for civilian goods, in an attempt to insure American industry to boost imports of high priced foreign copper.

As of July 1, makers of washing machines, ranges, refrigerators—even juke boxes and vending machines—will get 50 per cent of their pre-Korea tonnage of copper. Instead of 35 per cent, the National Production Authority announced.

Ridgway Assails Reds

ROME (AP)—Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway, in a blistering denial of Communist propaganda claims, Tuesday said "as God is my witness, germ warfare has never been used by the United Nations forces in Korea."

The new SHAPE commander said: "I know of no better illustration of the deliberate use of deliberately fabricated falsehood by Communist leadership than their charges that the United Nations command employed germ warfare in Korea."

Ridgway was speaking at an airport news conference shortly before taking off for Naples.

Communist threats of demonstrations against Ridgway, dubbed by the Reds "General Plague"—fizzled out during his two-day visit in the Italian capital.
