## Look Who's Here, White Sox Zoom!

Was poker-faced Paul Richards talking with tongue in cheek the other day when he praised the New York Yankees to the skies and moaned "How can you beat 'em?"

Those who know the clever Chicago pilot believe he was trying to lull the world champions into a false sense of security and at the same time present a challenge to his own White Sox.

In any event, from a listless bunch of second divisioners, Chicago has again become the "Go-

Go Sox" of the early 1931 campaign.

Giving every evidence that they have pennant designs of their own, the White Sox Tuesday night swept a doubleheader from the Philadelphia Athletics, 13-1 and 2-1, to roll up their eighth and ninth wins in the last 11 games.

**NEAR TRIBE**

The double win moved them to within a half game of the faltering Cleveland Indians and boosted them to within only three games of the front-running Yankees.

Chicago picked up ground on all the leaders as Detroit nipped the Yankees, 7-6, the St. Louis Browns beat Boston's Red Sox, 3-1 and Washington whipped the Indians, 4-3.

Brooklyn increased its National League lead to four games, wallowing the Chicago Cubs, 8-1 as Pittsburgh upset the second place New York Giants, 6-2.

Boston moved into a sixth place tie with Philadelphia, crushing Cincinnati, 5-1 while the Phils were held to a split in their doubleheader with the St. Louis Cardinals.

# Armory Fight Big One for Champ

## Victory Here Big Step Up

The Earl of Richmond, Northwest Middleweight King, Earl Turner, was due here today for some final polishing up before his title fight at the Armory Friday night against Indian Dick Wolfe. Wolfe is expected to check in sometime tomorrow.

This is a big fight for both men; there's a good deal more on the line than the Northwest middleweight crown.

For the champ, Turner, it could mean the beginning of the end or another entry into the national limelight. The California Negro's record makes him a real contender for a big shot at the national title, make no mistake about that. Turner is 32 now and needs a convincing win over a younger man like Wolfe.

Turner was up there knocking on the title door a few years ago. None other than the great Ray Robinson stopped that march by knocking Turner out in April of 1949. Need we say that it's no particular shame to be beaten by such a Sugar Ray?

The champ won his right to the Robinson fight by whipping Fred Apostoli after Apostoli had won from Marcel Thil, the topflight French champ.

Bringing Turner here for a title bout is a real feather in Promoter Mack Lillard's cap and the fans should flock to the fracas.

It's a big fight for Wolfe, too. The hard hitting Indian already has the Northwest welterweight title and picking up the middleweight belt would project him far into the national scheme of things.

Lillard has lined up a very promising list of preliminary fights for the title card. Yesterday, he added a high polish to the card by announcing that George Price, the high flying Merrill fighter, would have a bout on the program. Last night, Lillard was still angling for a good opponent for Price and will probably announce his choice sometime today.

The semi-final fracas is a return bout between Ralph Weiser, the Beatty crowd pleaser, and Bobby Dahl, of Boise. Weiser won a close nod over Dahl in their first encounter and this one is promising enough for a main bout on a normal fight card.

Two feuding Klamath fighters mix in one preliminary. This one puts Rudy Carlson in with Darrell Harrington. The two welterweights could put on a great battle.

Bruce Miller is down for another preliminary and his foe hasn't been announced yet.

Advance ticket sales are being handled at Dick Reeter's.

## PGA Big Threat To Name Golfers

LOUISVILLE (AP) — The tournament of upsets, the PGA championship, gets under way Wednesday and one of the latest bets in golf is that a lot of golfers who have been grabbing the headlines will be out of it by Saturday night.

And Saturday is only the halfway point in the week-long grind, consisting of two 18-hole qualifying rounds and five rounds of match play.

Most of the big names of the tournament circuit are in the field, although they had to change the rules to invite open champion Julius Boros.

But primarily the tournament is the private party of the rank and file of the Professional Golfers Association—the guys who stay at home teaching golf instead of following the more glamorous tournament trail.

**LOADED**

While players like Boros, defending champion Sam Snead, hot-and-cold Lloyd Mangrum, Porky Oliver and Cary Middlecott draw most of the attention, the field is loaded with little-known players who can shoot a round or two of great golf.

And one round is all that's needed to eliminate a favorite on the first day of match play. After the 36 holes of qualifying, the 64 survivors go into two 18-hole rounds of "sudden death" match play on Friday.

From there on the matches are over the more conclusive 36-hole distance. But often that's too late for the stats.

## Sauer Feels Dom's Drive

CHICAGO (AP) — Hank Sauer, the Chicago Cub's slugging outfielder who has been in a terrific batting slump for the last week, is being challenged by the Boston Red Sox' Dom Dimaggio as the best voter in the All-Star poll.

Sauer is still the most popular player in the nation-wide balloting by baseball fans with a total of 138,159 votes. But the Boston outfielder has climbed to 136,222 in the latest tabulations to throw the most serious challenge to Sauer's supremacy since the poll opened June 6.

Votes of the fans will determine the starting American and National League lineups for the 19th annual All-Star game at Philadelphia July 8. The poll will close at midnight June 27.

## Title Bout For Layne?

NEW YORK (AP) — International Boxing Club officials are scheduled to meet again Wednesday with Mary Jensen, manager of Rex Layne, on a proposed heavyweight boxing title match with champion Jersey Joe Walcott.

Layne was awarded a 10-round decision over Walcott in November, 1950, about eight months before he took the heavyweight title from Charles.
